

# GOOD PROSPECT OF SETTLEMENT

Its Only Effect Blow at Growth of Farming

BERLIN, Aug. 4.—The prospect of a speedy settlement of Morocco is welcomed on every hand, but the terms of the agreement, when they become known, probably will cause considerable dissatisfaction. The details still remain to be arranged. Both Germany and France have been compelled to concede a number of important points, because neither was prepared to press matters too far. The first indications of indignation among have appeared in the Pan-German Post and the Zukunft, the organ of Maximilian Harden. The leading article of the Pan-German Post today not only attacks foreign minister Von Kiderlin-Waechter and his chief, chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg, and demands their retirement from office, but also attacks the Kaiser, saying: "What has happened to the Hohenzollerns?" It also attacks the emperor's French supporters of the Anglo-French policy. The Pan-German Post concludes by calling the emperor "William the Friend" and "The Valorous Poltroon." Herr Arden in the Zukunft also attacks his Majesty severely, naming him "William the Peaceful."

**Not Too Optimistic**  
PARIS, Aug. 4.—According to a statement issued tonight, the Franco-German situation over Morocco shows a tendency to ameliorate. Germany, since the last interview between Ambassador Cambon and Foreign Secretary von Kiderlin-Waechter, having ceased to consider her original propositions as to be beyond modification. It is certain that the situation in the situation has resulted. Nevertheless, it cannot be disguised that there still is a considerable margin between Germany's pretensions and the concessions France is disposed to make, and while the turn taken by the negotiations evokes satisfaction, exaggerated optimism is out of place until further interviews between Ambassador Cambon and Major von Kiderlin-Waechter result in a complete agreement.

## PRESS COMMENT

**The General Election**  
The dissolution of parliament was inevitable, and the responsibility for it and for the "early" election rests upon the government. Sir W. Laurier and his colleagues introduced the referendum agreement and the "early" election. The trail of their record. For years they have been plying offence upon offence until they have stultified the history of their party and made Liberalism a synonym for graft, electoral corruption and the prostitution of public business to party ends. Six months ago or more they saw defeat ahead of them, and so they started their reciprocity campaign in order to hide the other issues that threatened their undoing.

But the opposition, representing public opinion, would not be put off by the trail, and during the short period since parliament again met Mr. Borden and his followers have persisted in showing to the misdeeds of the government. It was more than Sir W. Laurier could stand, so he has thrown the country into a general election in the midst of a busy year, and will try to make reciprocity the sole issue upon which he is to be tried.

Reciprocity will be a leading issue, but on it Mr. Borden has shown to the right. He has shown to the people, which the government would have denied if it could. Now that he has gained for the public the right to speak upon it he is prepared to open the matter, and to show, even according to the government's own arguments, he may be shown to be right again by the passage by the congress of the United States of a tariff measure which will give Canada without reciprocity all the advantages that even its supporters claim for it.

Canada has a thousand reasons for refusing to enter into a trade deal with the United States today for one that can be urged on its behalf. But reciprocity will not be the only issue, especially in the west. The dubious record of the administration, the taking away of our natural resources the indifference to the coal situation, the character of the ministers, these and other elements will come into the discussion, and before the people, and the opposition to the government of Sir W. Laurier welcomes the opportunity to refer them to the voters of Canada.—Calgary Daily Herald.

**Went Fisheries Act Repealed**—A petition addressed to the minister of marine and fisheries, drawing his attention to the manner in which fish, and especially codfish are caught in the San Juan Inlet for marketing purposes, is now in course of circulation among the land owners and residents of Victoria, and the San Juan district. The petitioners request that fishing for the market, except by British fishermen, be prohibited in the waters of the San Juan Inlet and that fishing with young salmon and trout as live bait in any salt water be disallowed, and that subsection 4 of section 4 of "The Fisheries Act," 1885, be repealed.

## PREDICTING EARTHQUAKES

Authority Claims Seismologists Would Not Be Justified in Doing So

LONDON, Aug. 4.—The annual conference of the International Association of Seismology was held this year in the Whitworth Hall of Manchester University under the presidency of Professor Schuster. The meeting was attended by representatives of Great Britain, Canada, United States, and nearly every European country. Professor Schuster, in his address, touched on the question of the prediction of earthquakes, remarking that even if the knowledge of seismology should allow them in future to make predictions of equal certainty to those of the meteorologist, the dangers of the predictions might outweigh the benefits.

A seismologist would not be justified in creating a panic and disturbing the peace of the community by predicting the time and place of an earthquake. The seismologist had to deal not with catastrophes but with microscopic movements of the soil to which the vibrations caused by a city's traffic were as the waves of the ocean compared to the ripples on a pool. Two types of short waves were frequently observed. One had been traced to the wind, which seemed to create waves over an extended land surface just as it did over the ocean. The other, which occurred in periods of from five to ten seconds, were more difficult to trace.

It had been suggested that they were due to waves striking the shore, and an interesting test upon that point is being carried out on the Yorkshire coast. Recently the question of the stability of the whole structure had come into prominence. The tidal deformation of the earth had been brought to light the curious result that the earth appeared to resist a change of shape in the directions of north and south less than in the east and west.

The physicist Love suggested that the want of symmetry in the rigidity was apparent only, and that the observed effects were caused by the attraction of the tide wave in the North Atlantic and its accompanying excess pressure on the bottom of the sea. Professor P. Hecker, director of the central bureau of the association, said that observations conducted in a well-known place near Potsdam, at a depth of about twenty metres showed that at Potsdam the deformation of the earth was greater in the north-east direction than in the south-west. He proceeded to describe the results of observations made in mines in Saxony and Bohemia, and suggested that new stations might be established.

The conference appointed a commission to consider the establishment of observation stations as suggested by Professor Hecker in consultation with the finance commission. Dr. Kottz (Canada) moved that a commission be appointed to discuss the possibility of securing uniformity in seismological bulletins, by which he believed all stations would be benefited, and this was also agreed to.

## BANKERS' SCHEME

Attorney-General's Report on General Holding Company Sent to Secretary of Treasury

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—Attorney-General Wickham's report upon his inquiry into the relations of the National City Bank with the recently organized National City company was transmitted to Secretary Macveagh today. It was learned today that the banking interests are prepared for an adverse decision by the secretary of the treasury, and that a complete understanding with the government will be reached without litigation.

## COLONEL GREENE ILL

Mining Magnate Stricken With Pneumonia and Medical Aid Sent by Special Train

EL PASO, Tex., Aug. 4.—A special train left this city late this afternoon with physicians and nurses bound for Cananea, Sonora, Mex., where Col. W. C. Greene, mining and cattle magnate, is believed to be dying from acute pneumonia.

Col. Greene was injured in a runaway a few days ago in Cananea. He sustained broken ribs and other injuries. It is believed pneumonia resulted from the injuries, and he is pronounced by very sick man. This special train was given a clear track over the western division of the El Paso and Southwestern, and will reach Cananea, about 200 miles distant, tonight.

Aboard the train was placed a supply of oxygen.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Aug. 4.—Captain Oman of the Des Moines sailed to the west coast today, today that the German warship Bremen had landed marines in Port An Prince. He said he had placed a guard on the American schooner lying alongside to protect President Simon, who was aboard awaiting the arrival of a line in which to escape from Hayti. Captain Oman said he had landed no forces, as there was no disorder. He has complete discretionary authority to deal with the situation and, may, land blue-jackets whenever he finds it necessary to do so.

# HOPE TO PASS BILL OVER VETO

Democratic Leaders Believe They Have Sufficient Votes to Secure Revision of Wool Schedule

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—Democratic leaders in the House of Representatives believe tonight that they have enough votes to pass the wool tariff revision over President Taft's veto if necessary.

Mr. Underwood, Democratic leader of the House and Senator La Follette, in urgent Republican, as a subcommittee, spent two hours today discussing the two bills out of which it is hoped to form a compromise wool tariff to send to the president.

The free list bill, which has been sent by both Houses to the same conference committee as that handling the wool bill, is to be considered at the same time.

## PROVINCIAL NEWS

C. F. Henza, a Vancouver painter, has been instantly killed, a few days ago by a sixty-foot fall from the steeple of the Mount Pleasant Methodist church. Henza was working with a partner, Frank Sheppard, when the scaffolding gave way and both fell to the ground. Sheppard sustained a fractured thigh and died later at the General Hospital.

A Chinaman from this city, known as Ma-Lew Lew, has been drowned in False Creek, Vancouver. A coroner's inquest in connection with the death of John Garland of Cumberland, who was killed by a tree falling on the roof of the cook-house at Cogitum dam, has resulted in the return of a verdict of accident with no blame attached to anyone.

James O'Brien of Fernie was the victim of an appalling accident in Seattle last Wednesday. He was working in the east shore when his sleeve caught in the running machinery, his arm was torn out at the shoulder, both legs were broken, several ribs were crushed in and he received also severe internal injuries.

The long period of dry weather is held responsible for several serious bush fires now raging on Vancouver Island. The fire wardens appointed by the Provincial government are everywhere reported to be doing excellent work.

The Cowichan fair of this year is to be held at Duncan on the 22nd and 23rd proximo. The Cowichan district exhibition grows better annually and this year's show is expected to be by far the most successful any in the history of the association.

South Vancouver's new municipal hall is expected to be ready for occupancy by the 15th instant.

The corporations of the new Anglican church at Kelowna was laid with all due ceremony on Sunday last, the special preacher of the occasion being Rev. H. A. Solly, rector of Sumnerland.

Mr. W. E. Scott, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, has promised to recommend the establishment of a demonstration orchard in the Columbia valley.

Dominico Botta, an Italian rancher resident at Kamloops, committed suicide by drowning himself in the South Thompson on Sunday last. Despondency through brooding over the sale of his ranch some weeks ago is held responsible for the deed.

The incorporation is announced of the Grand Forks Co., which is capitalized at \$15,000 and will shortly undertake the construction, maintenance and operation of a street railway within the limits of the municipality of Grand Forks. A heavy bush fire has been raging for several days past between Langley and New Westminster, and the telegraph wires have been down the greater part of the week in consequence.

F. P. Lowmorth, formerly superintendent of the Napolean mine at Grand Forks, has been appointed assistant superintendent of the B. C. Copper Co. at Greenwood and has removed to that city.

Sworn statements have been lodged with the provincial police at Creston, charging W. Burton of the Hurstville house there with two violations of the Provincial liquor act, and also with assault. At present Creston is in a unique position, having no resident magistrates, and these complaints of Nelson, where they will be heard in the Provincial court. Some months ago, owing to the fact that a number of youths and interlopers had allegedly been supplied with liquor at Creston, a citizens' committee was formed there to look into matters. This committee is aiding in the prosecutions now initiated.
