Protecting Airplane Propellers.

An aluminum plating for airplane propellers has been devised for the purpose of protecting the wood from the influence of the weather, which has been a serious problem heretofore. The plating is a chin-leaf-which is incorporated in the finish of the propellers, and the idea was developed by the forest products laboratory at Madison, Wis., and placed in production by the war department. The process is practically 100 per cent effective in preventing absorption of water, particularly in the storage atage. A French authority states that S0 per cent of the French propellers produced are rejected by the pilots mainly because they are out of balance.
