It is a safe principle to go upon that each deliberative body entitled to choose from among its members its own presiding officer. We see in the complications which have arisen in connection with the mayoralty the disdvantages of the system of election now in vogue, and it is at least worth considering if it would not be to the interest of the city to revert to the plan which proved so satisfactory while in vogue, of choosing the

If the water-tight compartments had been properly closed it seems impossible that the steamer should have sunk in twenty minutes. If it is true that the Kirby Hall was running at full speed or even half speed in the confined water in which the accident occurred, too much censure cannot be bestowed on the captain. This demonstration that any steamer on any trip is liable to be caught in a fog, run into, cut into two pieces and sunk in mid-ocean within twenty minutes of the collision, is not calculated to make sea-goers tranquil.
