There are no cavities or tubercles in the lungs, but merely a wasting away of the larger bronchial tubes, and doath takes place from obstruction of the bronchial tubes and air cells of the lungs. The patient dies from exhaustion and suffice ation, being unable to expecterate the nucous which accumulates in the passage leading to the lungs, which in some cases is sticky and small in quantity, but more commonly copious, of a light straw or yellowish green. Oftentimes streaks of blood make their appearance in the mucous, and at times there is a disagreeable smell.
