THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT BILL READ A FIRST TIME.

LONDON, April 27 .- In the House of Commons to-day Sir George Otto Trevelyan, Secretary for Scotland, introduced the

Local Government Bill for Scotland. It provides for the creation of a board similar to the Irish Local Government Board and establishes parish councils, the members of which are to be re-elected every three years. The parish council will administer the poor law, and are empowered to provide buildings for public purposes, and to acquire land for allotments. The bestowing powers of councils will be only limited by the Local Government Board. The Right A. J. Balfour criticized the bill, especially finding fault with the borrowing powers given to the councils.

After a short discussion the bill passed its

first reading.

By a vote of 232 to 207 the House adopted the resolution, introduced some days since by Sir George O. Trevelyan, Secre-tary for Scotland, providing for the ap-pointment of a grand committee of 87 members, including all the Scotch members of the House, to consider Scotch measures that may be referred to it.
