### BROOKE COUNCIL,

Alvinston, 15th December, 1911.  
Council met pursuant to adjournment and in accordance with statute.  
Members all present.  
Minutes of previous meeting read and on motion of Mr. Tait, seconded by Mr. Sutton, were approved.  
Correspondence read.  
From manager of Inwood Crown Bank in reference to advances for telephone system.  
From County Clerk asking that the Township appoint delegates to be part of the County deputation going to Ottawa to interview the Government re grants for good roads.  
Fisher—Tait, that W. G. Willoughby be appointed a delegate on behalf of Brooke, with Deputy Reeve Monro as alternate.

Report read re settlement of Townline expenditures and on motion of Darvill—Monro, was approved.  
Jas. Johnston, Esq., Chairman Local Board of Health, submitted and read his annual report for 1911. He asked for the sum of \$25.50 to remunerate members and pay expenses incurred.  
Monro—Fisher, that report be approved and order issued in favor of Mr. Johnston for sum asked for.—Carried.  
Wm. Cumming applied for remuneration for one sheep injured by dogs, valued at \$5.00.  
Fisher—Tait, that Mr. Cumming be paid the sum of \$4.00.—Carried.  
Monro—Fisher, that the adjourned Court of Revision on the Bourne Drain assessment be re-opened, the Reeve in the chair.—Carried.

D. McGugan, Sr., complained that the lots in the 11th and 12th concessions were only reduced to 10 per cent., while the lots in the 10th concessions were reduced to 20 per cent. He knew of no reason why they should not be treated alike.

### Darvill—Sutton, that the reductions and additions as proposed at last meeting on the lots in the 10th concession be confirmed, but that a further reduction of 10 per cent. be made on lots in the 11th and 12th concessions, based on the amended assessments as prepared by Clerk, the amount of these reductions to be added to amount payable by Township. That with these changes made the assessments be adopted and Court closed.—Carried.

By-law introduced and read, to levy the costs of the tiling of the Stewart Local drain, and amounting to \$609.88.  
Monro—Darvill, that by-law be read a third time and finally passed.—Carried.  
Fisher—Tait, that by-law fixing place and time for municipal nominations, and appointing the Deputy Returning Officers be read a third time and finally passed.—Carried.

By-law introduced and read to authorize a temporary loan of \$11,500.00 to pay off existing corporation notes and meet other liabilities until taxes were paid.  
Darvill—Monro, that by-law be read a third time and passed.—Carried.  
Monro—Sutton, that Council do now adjourn, sine die.—Carried.
