INDEX BOOKS COMPLETED

Periods From Jan. 1st, 1885, to Jan. 1st, 1905, Now Finished—Great Improvement in Registration System.

Registrar F. E. Bath and staff has just completed two consolidated index books, the first covering the period from Jan. 1st, 1885, to Dec. 31st, 1894, the second from Jan. 1st, 1895 to Jan. 1st, 1905. These include the most convenient, rapid and accurate guide to all transfers affecting real estate during these periods. Under the old system information now contained in three separate volumes. The information in the new books is all typewritten and thus more complete and more legible and easier followed. The loose leaf system is used to admit of the convenient insertion of new sheets as required.

The staff are well under way with book covering from 1876-1885.

Every entry in the new index books contains Grantor, Grantee, Book, Page of Record, Year of Registry, Location of Land, and Nature of Instrument. The names are entered alphabetically, not only as regards surnames, but as regards given names as well. This system is valuable by reason of the frequent recurrence of the same surname and also some first given names followed by additional initials. The placing of names thus greatly lessens the time taken in looking them up, a valuable consideration to all who use the books for search.

It has been urged that the new books indicated above are valuable chiefly to legal gentlemen inasmuch as the convenient arrangement greatly facilitates their work in making searches. That, of course, is perfectly true. Their work is very much shortened. However, time is money, and the time of a legal practitioner is valuable. It is a perfectly natural inference that a lawyer would charge more for work requiring two or three hours of time than he would for work requiring possibly a half hour or less. He would have to, just as any other person would do. The convenience and ultimate saving are the best justifications for bringing all records up to the uniform and easily followed arrangement secured in the books to which reference is made above.
