HUDSON's-BAY.

N the year 1733 I embarked on board the Mary frigate, commanded by captain George Spurrell, bound for Churchill-river in Hudfon's-Bay. We failed from Gravefend the 16th of May, put into Tinmouth the 24th, touched at Carftown in the Orkneys the 7th of June, and arrived at Churchill-river the 3d of August.

I was lered directly to Efkimaux-point at the entrand of the river, where I found feveral perfons employed in laying the foundation of a ftonefort. The principal workman was an old man, named Tuttie, who had been a labourer to mafons in London, and knew nothing of the theory of building; and the perfon whom the governor had appointed overfeer, was one Thomas Giddins, formerly a common foldier, but lately a hofier near London, who failing in his bufinefs, was taken into the Company's fervice and fent to Churchill-river, not as a tradefman, but as a common fervant.
