

Along these streets the daylight only old or lower class women appear on the streets at all. Corean gentleman in white costume promenades, elevated some four or five inches upon wooden clogs, which keep his white-stockinged feet out of the filth that everywhere abounds. Men and women never walk the streets together, and in

women betake themselves to the streets and spend their time until one o'clock in the morning, visiting their friends and indulging in such pastimes as may suit their fancy. The seclusion of women in Corea saves them from being the beasts of
