The mine was admittedly an unsafc oue, and untul recenty iwo inspectors had been emplojed. One of these inspectors was, from motives of economy, dispensed with, and as the rork was too great for one man the fine dicipline of tho mine was not perfect, and an explosion folluwed. In the accident of the 4 th inst. men were allowed to rork in such close proximity to an old and flooded mine as to break into it and thus cause the death of eighteen men. lhis was criminal carelessness on the part of the mine managers that should be insdo an example of. With the two disasters fullowing so closely upon each other tho State Government should awaken to the fact that it is called upon to intervene and compel the mine owners to observe proper precautions for the safety of their workmen.

On Sunday the rist inst a lsdy was killed by a fall of ice and snow from the roof of a house in the City of Quebec, and the coroner's jury agreed that the Corporation of the City of Quebec, the owner and occupants of the house are responsible for the ladv's death. This spreads the blame for the unfortunate occurrence over so large a field that tho lesson may fail to
do any good, but it would be well for houscholders in all cities to take pre do any good, but it would be well for householders in all cities to tuke pre
cautions against such accidents. During recent winters we have not been much troubled by masses of snow and ice overhanging the. sidewalks in Ealitax, but occasionally it does occur, and timid pedestrians are ia cunstiant fear of an avalanche. There is no guardntee that a snows alide will take

ring.
