There can be no exaggeration in any statement in regard to this matter, because no human imagination can create suything worse than the truth. The sorrow suything worse than the truth. The serrow and herrors of a wife with a drunken husband, or a mother with a drunken son, are as near the realization of hell as can be reached in this world at least. The shame, the indignation, the serrow, and the sense of disgrace for herself and children, the poverty, and not unfrequently the begarity—the fear and the fact of violence, lingering, life-long struggle and despair of countless women, with drunken husbands, are snough to make all women curse wine, and engage unitedly to oppose it everywhere as the worst enemy of their sex.
