DECLARATION OF COUNCIL

(Adopted from the United Kingdom Alliance of Great Britain.)

- 1.—That it is neither right nor politic for the Government to afford legal protection and sanction to any traffic or system that tends to increase crime, to waste the resources of the Province, to corrupt the social limbits, and to destroy the health and lives of the people.
- 2.—That the traffic in intoxicating liquors, as common beverages, is inimical to the true interests of individuals, and destructive of the order and welfare of Society, and ought, therefore, to be prohibited.
- 3.—That the history and results of all past legislation in regard to the liquor traffic, abundantly prove that it is impossible, satisfactorily, to limit or regulate a system so essentially mischievous in its tendencies.
- 4.—That no considerations of private gain or public revenue can justify the upholding of a system so utterly wrong in principle, suicidal in policy, and disastrous in results, as the traffic in linexicating liquors.
- 5. That the legislative prohibition of the liquor traffic is perfectly compatible with rational liberty and with all the claims of justice and legitinate commerce.
- 6.—That the legislative prohibition of the liquor traffic would be highly conducive to the development of a progressive civilization.
- 7.—That, rising above class, sectarian, or party considerations, all good citizens should ombine to procure an enactment prohibiting the sale of intoxicating beverages, as affording most efficient aid in removing the appalling evil of intemperance.
