Members of the new Parliament may well be reminded, and now as soon as possible after the excitement and worry of the elections, that directly after the general elections to the late Parliament, the mortality amongst the members began to increase abnormally. Fifteen members died during the first three years, March, 1890. This was at a rate of mortality more than double that of men ut about the average age of the members, or about three times over that amongst persons whose lives are insured. Attention has been called to this before now in this Journal, but in view of the value of such lives. it may not be out of place to frequently remind nembers of the fact, in order that such loss may, if possible, be avolded.
