

as both a summary of the substantial points raised in symposium and a collective document for furthering policy development in both Indonesia and Canada.

The day was organized as a full day of presentations and discussions, beginning with two keynote addresses by the Ambassadors from each country, followed by three panels, and ending with a final panel that brought all of the presenters back together to focus on the question of policy, that is, to identify appropriate steps that each country can take to facilitate future engagement. Following the two keynote addresses, by Randolph Mank, Canada's Ambassador to Indonesia, and by H.E. Eki Syachrudin, Indonesia's Ambassador to Canada, there were three panels, each made up of specialists from both Indonesia and Canada. The topics for each panel were chosen with regard to past and ongoing areas of Canadian involvement in Indonesia and how these are now being shaped by current changes in Indonesia, particularly in light of the elections. These topics are: political and security issues; economic and investment issues; and social development and foreign assistance issues. In preparation for these panels, we asked each panelist to consider the following three questions, questions intended to provoke thinking about the challenges of the present and the possibilities for the future:

- What do we really want to achieve (visions, targets and priorities)?
- With what means can we achieve these goals (your perspective on strategies)?
- What constraints might we anticipate?

The three questions thus focus on goals, strategies and constraints, with the panelists encouraged to not only analyze the present situation, but to be forward looking in terms of the potential for development in each of these three areas. This volume of proceedings follows the structure of presentations and discussions over the course of the day, and has been edited for clarity and continuity.
