2. The names, type and dimensions of such vessels.
3. Number of seizures of vessels made during 1927, the names of such vessels seized and how disposed of.
4. Value of spirits, and of goods seized on such vessels during 1927.
5. Cost of operation of the fleet of vessels employed in the Customs Protective Service in the Maritime Provincial waters during the calendar year 1927.
6. Vessels added to the service during 1927, by whom built and dimension and type.
7. How many of said vessels are the property of the department, what names or numbers they are known by.
8. What vessels employed in said service are chartered or hired, and their dimensions, type and hire rate.
9. How many additional vessels will be placed in the service during 1928, and what will be their dimensions, type, where built, by whom, and at what cost.
10. Whether any vessels for the Customs Protective Service are now on order.
11. If so, of what dimensions, type, and where they are being built and at what cost.

1. Whether any change has been made in immigration regulations in countries where medical examinations of immigrants are made.
2. If so, what the changes are, who authorized the same and why.
3. To what countries the new regulations apply, (a) in Great Britain, (b) the United States, (c) the continent of Europe.
4. Whether the said new examination applies to (a) Germany, and (b) Italy.

By Mr. Neill:—Order of the House for a Return showing:—

1. Number of Japanese landed in Canada for the first time, according to Canadian Government returns, during the calendar year 1927.
2. At what ports they landed.
3. How they were classified as to: (a) occupation; (b) sex.

By Mr. Neill:—Order of the House for a Return showing:—

1. Number of Chinese landed in Canada for the first time, according to Canadian Government returns, during the calendar year 1927.
2. Of those entering how many came as: (a) members of the diplomatic service and their servants; (b) merchants; (c) students; (d) under section 9, chapter 38 of the Chinese Immigration Act, 1923 (permits).
3. The classification as to occupation of those admitted under said section 9, chapter 38.
4. During the year whether any existing permits were renewed or extended for a further period, and if so, how many and for what further period.

By Mr. Clark:—Order of the House for a Return showing:—

1. To what countries an assisted passage is available.
2. Number of immigrants, specifying country of origin, Canada has secured under the system of assisted passage, by years.
3. Total cost to the immigrant of an assisted passage.
4. Total cost to Canada by reason of the system of assisted passages.
