

to be expended either in the provincial capital or in some other suitable place as the provincial government may determine. I do not think all this money should be used for a national war memorial in one place. Let it be clear that this party will support the expenditure of money in Ottawa to make this a beautiful capital, not on the excuse that it is a national war memorial, but on its merits, and for no other reason.

Motion agreed to, on division, bill read the second time and the house went into committee thereon, Mr. Golding in the chair.

On section 1—"National capital district."

Mr. ST. LAURENT: Mr. Chairman, when this measure was at the resolution stage the leader of the opposition asked certain questions with respect to it. I had some answers ready; but while the motion for second reading of the bill was being put by Mr.

Speaker, an hon. member was already on his feet to take the floor, and no sooner had the last words left the Speaker's lips that that hon. member commenced. From that moment until two minutes ago, when the motion was put, there has been always at least one hon. member up before the preceding speaker had quite finished. Since it would take me more than the two minutes now remaining before eleven o'clock to answer the questions asked, I move that you do now report progress and ask leave to sit again.

Mr. CHURCH: It should be withdrawn and left as a municipal institution.

Section stands.

Progress reported.

At eleven o'clock the house adjourned, without question put, pursuant to standing order.
