NETHERLANDS LIBERATION DAY

FORESTRY

CALL FOR ESTABLISHMENT OF SEPARATE DEPARTMENT

Mr. Ernie Epp (Thunder Bay—Nipigon): Mr. Speaker, during the 1984 election campaign the Conservative Party promised to establish a Department of Forestry to oversee this important Canadian industry. It employs nearly 900,000 workers directly or indirectly. Its value of shipments exceeds \$30 billion annually, and its annual exports exceed \$16 billion. New Democrats continue to support the establishment of a separate Department but the Conservative Government now appears to have abandoned this promise.

New Democrats have been calling upon the Government to bring in a new National Forest Act to replace the old one dating back to 1966. Research expenditure in the industry is at an extremely low level. It is currently running at less than half the level of expenditure of our major competitors. It is also below the Canadian average for industrial sectors and other resource sectors such as agriculture and mining. Silviculture expenditures need to be increased at both government and industry levels.

New Democrats call upon the Government to give Canada's number one industry the attention it requires. Only then will this renewable resource be able to continue to provide its benefits to all Canadians and do so indefinitely.
