### **GOODS AND SERVICES TAX**

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**Mr. Ron MacDonald (Dartmouth):** Mr. Speaker, the Liberal party continues to stand with the overwhelming number of Canadians who oppose this government's goods and service tax.

Yesterday, members of the House saw a feeble attempt by the Minister of Finance to undermine the unprecedented success of last week's anti–GST hotline organized by the Liberal party which received calls from more than 70,000 Canadian households calling in their opposition to the goods and service tax.

In response to a planted question—and a poor one at that—from the member for Halton—Peel, the Minister of Finance gushed as he told the House that since last August his toll free GST line had received about 100,000 calls from Canadians questioning the tax. After spending tonnes and tonnes and tonnes of taxpayers' money in promoting his hotline, the Minister of Finance has only received an average of about 400 calls a day. He cannot even tell us if one of those callers supported this unfair tax.

On the other hand, the Liberal hotline which people had to pay to use because we have not abused taxpayers' money on this side, got over 10,000 per day with every caller opposed to the goods and service tax.

Today, I issue a challenge to the Minister of Finance: be brave, be responsible, be fair. Set up a 1–800 service that will give all Canadians a chance to vote either for or against the GST. The Minister of Finance may then finally see the error of his ways, do the right thing, and axe this tax.
