Robert John Fleming Named as Director—The Objects—Head Office Is in Toronto.

OTTAWA, April 18.—(Can. Press).—Canada Gazette this week contains notice of the incorporation of the Dominion Lacrosse Association of Canada, Limited, with a capital stock of \$20,000. These incorporators are: Charles Laurs Quere and Robert James Fleming, managers of the City of Toronto, and Joseph Alexander Cousineau, Hector Roussin Bisson, advocate, and Edward Charles St. Pere, journalist, of the City of Montreal. The objects of the association are stated to be:

a. "To encourage, develop and improve the national game of lacrosse and other athletic sports generally; (b) to hold, order and arrange lacrosse and other matches and competitions and offer and grant or contribute towards the provision of prizes, awards and distinctions; (c) to subscribe to, become a member of and to co-operate with any other association, whether incorporated or not, whose objects are altogether or in part similar to those of this company; (d) to provide and maintain lacrosse and other athletic grounds, buildings and other suitable means of accommodation or entertainment for conducting lacrosse matches and all athletic sports and pastimes; (e) to raise money by subscription and to grant rights or privileges to subscribers and others; (f) to purchase or otherwise acquire the assets in whole or in part of any other club or association having objects similar to those of this company, and to pay for the same, either in cash or in shares of this company. The head office is to be located at Toronto.

LACROSSE OUTLOOK CLEARS GRADUALLY

Con Jones on His Way to the Coast to Put Commission Idea to His Conferees.

The lacrosse cloud is gradually passing over and only faint mutterings are still being heard from the west as to the revival of another lacrosse war. Con. The annual meeting of the Pacific Coast League will be held on Saturday, April 26, and it is expected that by that time everything will be in running order for getting this commission business on a strong footing. If, however, New Westminster decides to stand aloof the Salmon Belles will go ahead and play with Victoria and leave them out in the cold.
