HAMILTON DID NOT GET A REDUCTION

Why Hydro Board Failed to Include the City in Favored List.

EAST-END INCLINE RY.

Judge Snider Has Made His Award in the Webb Arbitration.

(Special to The Toronto World.) HAMILTON, Nov. 20.—

Unlike other cities where the hydro-electric power is used, Hamilton did not get a reduction in the price of the power.

The reason for this was that Hamilton has always charged the domestic and commercial lighting customers less than the rates charged by the commission in Toronto.

Toronto charges four cents per kilowatt for the first hundred square feet of lighting space, three cents for the second hundred, with ten per cent. off for cash.

Hamilton's charges are the same, but twenty per cent. discount is allowed for cash.

It is expected that the provincial commission will ask the Hamilton commission to assist in the maintenance and cost of all the commission lines from Dundurn street to the beach pumping house and of other lines it has in the city.

If this is done the city will likely get a reduction of perhaps \$1 or \$1.50 on the present price of \$15.

To Wait on Dominion Commissioners. The entire board of control will wait on the Dominion Railway Board at Toronto next Monday afternoon.

At a meeting of the board of control yesterday morning, Mr. Malone, acting mayor, presented a petition signed by a full list of the residents, protesting the closing of the incline and stated that the management had refused to spend \$3000 for repairs.

It was further shown that 800 persons and 400 vehicles traveled on it before it was closed down and that now all of these are affected and have to walk up or down the steps.

In Favor of the City. Last year the ratepayers of Hamilton voted \$150,000 for the purpose of buying property on the mountain face for park purposes, but the scheme being made public the prices of all the property were at once boosted.

A Peculiar Case. According to a statement made by Mayor Allan, thru one of the local attorney, nothing can be done to stop the young children attending school from the possibility of developing tuberculosis or consumption from a certain small lad who has passed all hope of recovery, and who is still attending one of the public schools in Hamilton.

The school nurse attending the lad has taken several photographs of the boy in different poses to show the horrible effects tuberculosis has on children, and nothing has been done to keep him apart from the other scholars.

It is expected that the parents of the lad in the class will communicate with the health officials and the mayor to see if the boy cannot be kept out of school and placed in a home for incurables.
