An Act for the relief of Joseph Gagne.

Preamble.

WHEREAS Joseph Gagne, domiciled in Canada and residing at Cap-Chat, in the province of Quebec, has by his petition alleged that on the seventh day of February, A.D. 1934, at Saint-Ulric-de-Riviere-Blanche, in the said province, he and Marie-Jeanne Gagnon, who was then of Saint-Ulric-de-Riviere-Blanche aforesaid, a spinster, were married; and whereas by his petition he has prayed that, because of her adultery since then, their marriage be dissolved, and whereas the said marriage and adultery have been proved by evidence adduced and it is expedient that 10 the prayer of his petition be granted: Therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

Marriage dissolved.

1. The said marriage between Joseph Gagne and Marie-Jeanne Gagnon, his wife, is hereby dissolved, and shall be 15 henceforth null and void to all intents and purposes what-soever.

Right to marry again.

2. The said Joseph Gagne may at any time hereafter marry any woman whom he might lawfully marry if the said marriage with the said Marie-Jeanne Gagnon had not 20 been solemnized.
