Early in January the champion trotter, Uhlan (1.53%), will be shipped from Cleveland, where he has been quartered at the North Randall track since the close of his campaign, to Brunswick, Ga., there to be made ready for a trip to Russia in the Griy summer.

The journey abroad is being made in fulfilment of a promise made by C. K. G. Billings, owner of Uhlan, to Russian breeders, when he was there two years ago with Lou Dillon. The chestnut mare, after being off the turf several years, and foaling two colts, had as much speed for a brush as ever, and her exhibitions were a revelation to the foreigners. Uhlan is to be driven to wagon by Mr. Billings during his trip, and it is the intention to have him up to a mile faster than any trotter has shown outside of the States, after which he will be returned to New York and pointed for an effort against his own best mark.

Mr. Billings has a winter place near Brunswick, and during previous winters has jogged the gelding on the roads thru the pine forests thereabouts. It is not known whether any horses other than Uhlan will make the trip to Russia, nor whether other countries will be visited. When Lou Dillon went abroad she was accompanied by several other members of the Billings stable, and one of them, the stallon Fleming Boy, was presented by Mr. Billings to the Austrlan Jockey Club, and new is being used in the stud.

JUDEAN CLUB CHAMPIONS Defeated the Capitals by 9-6 in Great


