Manila was one of the first cities to have the commission form of municipal government. This was organized during the civil governorship of Mr. Taft. Consisting originally of three members, appointed by him; it now has six, four of whom are appointed by the governor-general, and two (up to the present time natives) elected by the popular vote. Under this form of administration, says a writer in The Century, Manila has been able to make rapid progress in practical, sanitary and aesthetic development.

Five years ago the areas recognized as public parks were confined to the Luneta and half a dozen comparatively small plazas. In accordance with plans and reports prepared by the com nittee on parks, the municipal board has not only converted the moats surrounding the Intramuros, in the heart of the city, into spacious parks and playgrounds, but has been acquiring areas in the suburbs at a rate which in five years more will make Manila, where large, open, breathing spaces are essential to public health and confort, one of the best-parked cities in the world.



WHO IS POLLY PRIM?

When a foreign body is situated near the surface of a phalanx, that surface should face the exam ner, or transiliumination must be made from side to side. Dark markings upon the skin, such as dirt on the fin-ers, ink stains, judine or silver-mitrate marks, and scabs or secretions become prominetally apparent in these examinations. The superfical veins also become visible, but after compression they transmit the fight. Folds of skin must be smoothed to admit of uniform transitioners.

"Because of obvious difficulty the fluoroscope or the X-rays are often not available in private practice. Even in hospitals and dispensaries the routine use of these for locating foreign bodies in expensive. Again, time elapses, and a needle fragment may be displaced within a tew hours from its original position. Transillumination is, therefore, a ready aid. Splinters of wood are not revealed by the X-ray, or they may break and large pieces may be left in the tiesues unrecognized and form a pus focus. In these cases transillumination is valuable. . . With the foreign body visibly before one no probing is necessary."
