New York, Aug. 26.—A monster shark in Prince's Bay opened and closed his jaws on Charles Boone, a visitor at Father Drungoole's Home at Mount Loretta, Staten Island, Monday afternoon. Almost by a miracle Boone escaped instant death.
Boone is in the Smith Infirmary now, with horrible lacerations in his right thigh. The surgeons say that he will survive his wounds unless septic poisoning sets in.

The young man is 22 years old and lives in New Jersey. He is studying for the priesthood in a Maryland college, and was spending his teeth. If he had, he would have bitten the leg off as easily as a pair of shears that are used to cut iron bars.




