Before proceeding to the routine business of the meeting the president announced that the exhibits of Prof. Downey of Mc-Gill had arrived and were on display in

the Assembly Hall.

The first paper on the list for the morning session was on the use of chloroform and ether as anesthetics. It was read by Dr. W. B. Jones of Rochester.

Drugs Won't Cure.

Dr. A. R. Robinson of New York contributed an essay on the treatment of cancer. He gave an account of his 20 years experience as a surgeon, and discussed the use of drugs as a cure for cancer. In this connection, the doctor said: "We know of no drug, no serum or no toxine, which, administered internally will provide a remedy for any cancerous growth."

The rest of Dr. Robinson's paper was devoted to a criticism and refutation of the views of Dr. Watson Chaney on the treatment of cancer. The doctor attempted to show that caustic applied in a certain way could attack outlying deposits or cancerous growths better than or as well as the surgeon's knife. Dr. Robinson preferred the knife to the caustic, and yet he claimed that the same end could be obtained by a well-advised use of the caustic.

Dr. Robinson's paper was attentively followed by all. He illustrated his points with drawings and photographs, and his protest against the assertion of Dr. Chanzy, namely that no treatment is suitable in the case of cancer except the knife, was well received.

In presenting the report of the committee the doctor briefly summarized the attempt to bring about Dominion registration. He said this question of Dominion registration was as old as the Dominion itself. Almost immediately after the B. N. A. of 1867 the medical profession felt that a great mistake had been made by the fathers of Confederation, in that they had not placed professional education under the control of the Dominion Parliament, and left local educational affairs to the local governments. Hence in 1863 a bill was introduced in the Federal Parliament to remedy this apparent defect in the B.N.A. Act. Unfortunately, the bill was thrown out by the Senate.

Another Attempt Falls.

No further steps were taken till 1894, when, at the convention held at St. John, a committee was appointed to inquire into the question. A scheme of interprovincial registration was then attempted, but it was found impossible because delegates from the Province of Quebeq did not offer any hope of making the medical exmination in Quebec similar to that in Ontario.

Dr. Roddick then took up the question how far a Dominion measure was suitable. The advice of the law officers of the Crown was that any Dominion measure establishing a central qualification was ultra vires and unconstitutional. He believed that under clause 91 of the British North America Act, which granted the Federal Parliament the legal right to make laws for the peace, order and good government of Canada, that under this clause could be built up a measure which would remedy grievances and disputes between the various provinces re medical affairs. Such an Act would simply organize a body with no powers whatever.

New Dominion Board.

The next question Dr. Roddick discussed was the appointment of this new Dominion Medical Board. On behalf of the committee, Dr. Roddick urged that each province have three members on the council, the representatives to be chosen as follows; One nominated by the Governor-General-in-Council; one elected by the various medical boards of each province, and the third, an ex-officio member, the president of the Provincial autonomy in the least.

Whereas the standards of education for the profession of medicine and surgery and the qualifications for the practice of the profession vary in each of the provinces of Canada, and the assimilation of these standards, and, if practicable, the establishment of uniform standards throughout the Dominion are desirable.

And whereas, in consequence of the provisions of the Acts of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, known as the "Medical Acts," medical and surgical practitioners, who are by the law of a province of Canada entitled to practise the profession in such province, cannot obtain the benefits of registration under the said Acts, inasmuch as by the said provisions the qualifications required for such registration must be regulated by the Parliament of Canada;

And whereas a medical and surgical practitioner duly registered according

tion must be regulated by the Parliament of Canada;
And whereas a medical and surgical practitioner duly registered according to the law of one province of Canada cannot legally practise in another province without being duly registered in such other province;
And whereas serious practical inconveniences both to the public and to medical and surgical practitioners have arisen from the above cause;
And whereas it is desirable to assimilate and, if possible, to unify the various standards of qualification established by the several provinces of Canada as conditions of admission to the study of the profession, and to the practice thereof, such assimilation and unification being best attained by the establishment of some central authority with power to hold examinations of, and to establish and maintain a system of medical legislation of, such persons as desire to practise the profession in more than one province of Canada;
