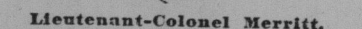

Body Guard as cornet 29th February,

The King Edward Hotel, ever alert for up-to-date methods, has adopted the Holmes system of checking night watchmen, which is already in extensive use throughout Toronto.

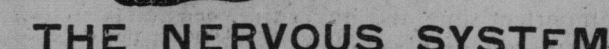
