ASSEMBLY FOR UNION

WITH SOME DISSIDENTS

Breezy Discussion Among the Pres-

byterians, With Arguments For

and Against Conception.

Kingston, June 13.—One of the great-

est questions that have occupied the at-

tention of the Presbyterian General As-

sembly came up this afternoon in that

of church union. In the absence of Dr.

Ward, the vice-president, Principal Pat-

rick of Winnipeg presented the com-

mittee report, which recited the dis-

cussion of the joint conference last

December and recommended that the

presbytery committee be reappointed,

substituting names for those who have

been named. Dr. Patricke said the work

had just begun, some departments of it

not even that. The committee had taken

the stand that they should not ask

the church to give any decision until

the committee had exhausted every pos-

sible question that might arise. Each

committee should assist by discussing

the question themselves. There must

be no union at the cost of dis-

union. All the members of the three

churches must be carried, if possible,

adopt the report.

Principal Maclearen of Knox said he

REV. J. P. LEWIS' PROTESTS

Synod Executive Curtailed Report of

Audit Committee and Heated

Debate Ensues.

Because the executive committee

suppressed certain items in his report

as to the finances of the Anglican synod

Rev. J. P. Lewis yesterday refused to

move the adoption of the report of the

audit committee, of which he is chair-

man. In a heated debate Mr. Lewis

said he was only doing his duty in

protesting. He was told by S. H. Blake

that it was not right for a com-

mittee to recede from such a broad

statement in the reports of the church's

finances. The members of synod agreed with Mr.

Blake. Rev. J. P. Lewis commenced

by objecting to the mutilation of the

audit committee's report by the execu-

tive committee, and moved to have the

clauses printed and distributed among

the members, which the executive com-

mittee had struck out. The motion

was on a vote of 5 to 3. Rev. Mr.

Lewis said that this question was one

which affected the very existence of

the audit committee. If the report

was not to be presented in its entirety

to the synod, to be dealt with, there

was little use for the committee. Better

would it be to transfer its func-

tions to the executive committee, and

let them assume full responsibility.

He said, that despite the increas-

ed value in real estate in the past few

years, the synod's investments had not

shown increased value, and there was

danger of losing \$200,000 by more ad-

ministration. Part of the properties

had been sold, and the loss of \$200,000

was not a small one. The committee had

found that bonds aggregating \$5000

were not valid, and he would like to

know the value of the bonds. The synod

to guarantee these bonds. The audit

committee, he believed, was only

doing its duty. The executive com-

mittee had not exceeded the canon. It

had not mutilated, revised or com-

mented on the report. It is given to

the power to print what it deems

expedient. Last year the synod had

been told that the committee was only

bringing in an amended report as

ordered.

N. W. Boyles said the whole report

is here, and when the proper time

comes, the chairman has the right to

move it.

Rev. Mr. Lewis: I will not move it.

It is not our report.

S. H. Blake, K.C., said it was no

part of a committee to discuss the

weakness of investments and put

them in a report to be printed and

broadcast thru the press. The

executive committee had used a "wise

precaution." The matter could be dis-

cussed when the report was pre-

sented. The committee had not mu-

tilated, revised or commented on the

report. The committee had only

printed a part of it. Mr. Blake said

he thought the bonds were quite good.

Rev. Mr. Lewis said that on the au-

thority of the synod's lawyer, these

bonds were said to be utterly use-

less.

The reports of the clergy commu-

nication fund and the synod's fund

and lands committee were adopted

without comment.

The report of the special committee

on the episcopal endowment fund

showed rather a lack of interest in

ENGLISH COMPANY WINDS UP.

Rainy River Development Co. suc-

cumbs to Bad Management.

The Rainy River Development Co.,

an English mining company, with a

capital of \$1,500,000, with the wind-

up of the company, was wound up by

Justice Meredith yesterday morning and

the order for the winding-up given. No

one offered any opposition to the or-

der. The assets of the company are min-

ing lands of doubtful value and the li-

abilities are in the neighborhood of

\$10,000.

The failure of the firm was due to

bad management. Over half a

million had been invested in the work

of developing New Ontario and despite

this seeming abundance of money

sheriffs with writs against it were un-

able to find anything on which to re-

lieve. It had no assets of any value

with which to meet its liabilities.

It is W. A. Preston who is asking for

the winding-up. The Ontario representa-

tive of the firm is W. A. Weir of Rat

Portage.

AMENDING THE COMPANIES ACT.

To Make Stock Issues Optional—In

the Senate.

Ottawa, June 13.—(Special.)—In the

Senate this afternoon the following

bill was read a third time and passed:

Act respecting the Companies, Tu-

kon and Pacific Railway Co.; act re-

specting the Great Northern Railway

of Canada; act respecting the Canada

Central Railway Company; act respect-

ing the Vancouver and Coast Kootenay

Railway Company; act respecting the

Kaslo and Ladang Railway Company.

notice of application in the clerk's

office instead of in the court house,

was read a third time and passed.

Hon. Mr. Scott introduced a bill to

amend the Companies Act so as to

bill was read a third time and passed.

The bill was introduced by the

president of the Bank of Commerce,

in order to make the Canadian system

of stock certificates and warrants

the same as that of the United States.
