The Cockneys' stock jumped about 50 points Saturday afternoon. To beat one of the strongest independent teams on the continent is no small thing to be proud of, and the team that administered a coat of whitewash to the redoubtable Columbia Giants, breaking a local fans. It was a beautiful game, stubborn, fast and clean. The Giants didn't get in any of their minstrel show business, so conspicuous in the latter half of Friday's game. They hadn't time for it. They simply played the best kind of ball they knew-and lost. But for a low-thrown ball from Babbitt that got through McFadden, London's game would have been errorless. The home team is certainly wellfixed for pitchers. Sievers and Cooper ought to win games for London this year. Sievers pitched the last five innings Saturday, and the Giants, who have really good batting ability, got only one infield hit off him. Price, who pitched the first four innings, did not fare quite so well, but did very creditable work. "Kid" Mohler's work on second was brilliant. That he had ten put outs to his credit was partly due to the fact that he covered infield and Carey's fob in the right field a sinecure. Carey, the sometime favorite, appears to be under a cloud. Four times at bat and neither a hit nor a put-out to show, though he did manage to send one long fly to the right field. It is to be hoped his sky will clear shortly. With the exception of one passed ball, McConnell did splendid work behind the bat, and made the only two-bagger of the game. Babbitt played a fine game, batted well, though without luck, and shared Mohler's ambition to cover at least half of the entire neld. He fielded smartly, and put the ball to first |

the game. The Giants went first to bat. A single by Johnson to short was the extent of the hitting. Johnson got second on fielder's choice. But there the matter ended. Howells went first to bat for London, and landed the ball safely in the left field. He very cleverly stole second, and scored on a drive to left field by McFadden. Carey and Babbitt went out in quick succession, and McFadden was left on second. The second inning for London was big with promise. Jones was struck by the pitcher, and walked. Cope came next, and Miller fell all over the ball in attempting to field it. Mc 'onnell then went out at first.
