Secondary Cause.

The discovery of the case of smallpox at the collegiate, making the eleventh found in London in the past few weeks, is proof positive, says Dr. Hill, that there is a secondary cause of the disease. The other ten cases have all been centred at one factory, the patients being either employees of this plant or members of employees of this plant or members of employees.

"The discovery of this case means another source of infection," says Dr. Hill. "It means that there is some hidden cause and that some one who has had the disease has gone out before being entirely recovered. Out of respect for themselves as well as others, everyone in the city who has not been vaccinated within the past seven years and whose vaccination, if in that time, has not taken, should be vaccinated at once. With this second source unknowr, there is no telling where smallpox will be encountered, and it is up to the citizens to be vaccinated.
