

MORMONS' PRESENCE A MENACE TO LAND

London Presbytery Would Arouse
the Whole Church to
Danger.

The regular May meeting of the Presbytery of London was held in St. Andrew's Church, yesterday, beginning at 10:30 a.m. Rev. A. W. Reede, B.A., of St. Thomas, was in the chair, and Rev. A. Henderson was clerk. The attendance was not as large as usual. Among those present were Rev. Messrs. J. G. Stuart, W. Moffat, T. H. Mitchell, and H. Mackay, London; W. H. Geddes, Alisa Craig; A. Jameson, Wardville, and Drs. McCrae, Westminster; Munro, of Birr, and Nixon, of Hyde Park, ministers; and Messrs. A. S. Macgregor, John Lawson, H. F. Jelly, James Robb, D. Fletcher, elders. Mr. R. M. Stevenson, a student of Queen's College, who is supplying St. Andrew's Church for Dr. Ross, applied to the presbytery to be taken on trial for license.

Rev. R. W. Lettich, of Delaware, was elected by rotation to the General Assembly.

Rev. A. Henderson reported that he had declared the pulpit of the First Church vacant, and asked leave to moderate in a call when the people were ready. The presbytery granted the request.

A request from Port Stanley to sell the manse and build a more suitable building for the residence of their minister was granted.

A student has been sent for the summer to Mount Brydges to be under the care of Rev. Mr. Lettich and his session.

Arrangements were sanctioned for the opening of a Sunday school mission on Egerton street under the auspices of the Presbyterian Council of London. A building will be erected, and leave was granted to mortgage the property for \$1200. The following trustees were appointed: Rev. Messrs. Rollins and Stuart, and Mr. J. Bryan. Mr. Geddes, Dr. Munro, T. Stuart, K. C., and A. S. Macgregor were appointed a committee to bring in a report on the Mormon question.

Rev. Dr. McCrae, J. G. Stuart and P. J. Thompson were appointed a committee to bring in a resolution in regard to the illness of Rev. Dr. Ross, of St. Andrew's Church.

Rev. J. Currie presented the augmentation report. All grants were made in full, except that of Wardville, which was reduced. Presbytery will renew the application for the full amount to Wardville at its September meeting.

The members of the presbytery are still supplying Mr. Shearer's pulpit. All the ministers have been most kind and generous in their help to their sick brother.

Mr. A. Stuart, K. C., reported a pleasant visit to the congregation and spoke kind words of Mr. Shearer's people.

The Mormon Question.

At the afternoon meeting of the Presbytery, the question of the Mormons in Canada was discussed in connection with the following overture to the general assembly, submitted by Rev. W. H. Geddes, of Alisa Craig:

"Whereas, the presence of the Mormon element in certain parts of the Dominion, and the danger thereby of the perpetuation of the practice of polygamy is a serious menace to the morals of our land, and

"Whereas the people of the United States have, for years, suffered very seriously from the same element,

This presbytery overtures the assembly to take such action as will arouse the whole church to the peril of those parts of the Dominion affected, and at the same time approach the other branches of the Christian church to take joint action in the matter."

The overture was supported by Mr. Geddes and Rev. Mr. Jamieson.

Dr. McCrae was not able to see that the Dominion Government had power to apply any religious test in admitting immigrants into the Dominion.

Mr. Currie, Mr. Stuart, and others thought the presbytery had better wait until it had the facts.

Ultimately, the overture, as given above, was adopted.

Resolution of Sympathy.

Dr. McCrae presented a resolution or expression of the sympathy of the presbytery with Rev. Dr. Ross in his illness. The presbytery unanimously agreed to forward the resolution to Dr. Ross.

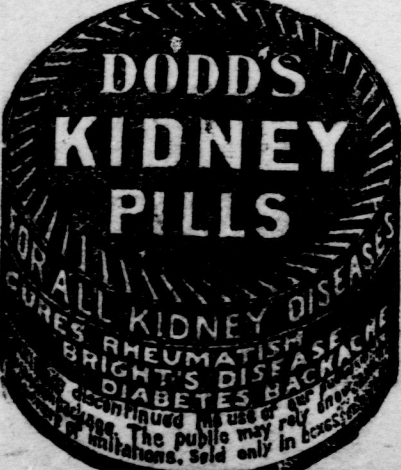
Applications were received from six clergymen of other churches to be received as ministers of the Presbyterian Church.

The report on statistics was presented by Dr. Nixon. On the whole there has been good progress in all departments of church life and work.

It was arranged that an adjourned meeting of the presbytery be held on the 21st of May in St. Andrew's Church at 10:30.

Dr. McCrae presented an invitation to meet in July at the First Church, Westminster. Mr. Jelly gave notification to Port Stanley. As the Presbytery had not met at Port Stanley for many years, and had been at Westminster, it was carried to meet this time at Port Stanley on the first Tuesday of July at 10:30.

Queries Answered -

SURVEY.—A purchased a lot from B. Who pays for the surveying? Ans.—The purchase or sale of a lot does not ordinarily involve a survey. When it does, it depends upon the circumstances as to who must pay for it. If the vendor cannot describe the land in the deed which he is to give, without a survey, he must pay for it, and if the purchaser cannot locate the land from the description in the deed without a survey, then he must pay for it.

The cinematograph has demonstrated its usefulness to the science of medicine in more ways than one. Dr. W. G. Chase, of Edinburgh, used it to procure films illustrating the convulsions accompanying an epileptic fit. The thoroughness with which the subject has been pursued may be judged from the statement that the films exhibiting epileptic seizures measure 1,550 feet and contain nearly 23,000 minute pictures of attitudes assumed during the convulsions. The value of such records lies mainly in using them to instruct medical students so that they may recognize the character of a fit when encountered by actual practice. It seems very possible that the cinematograph will be used extensively in the future to make permanent record, but only of such seizures as those described, but that difficult and unusual surgical operations will be thus depicted.
