How to Can Green Corn—Cut ripe sweet corn from the cobs and pack in glass jars, pressing the corn down as tightly as possible. (A little wooden mallet that exactly fits the jar is useful to press it down with). To each quart can, add 1 teaspoon salt. Place

the tops an extra turn if the glass has contracted.
Another way is to boil the beans until done and add a tablespoon of vinegar to each quart (or less, as it depends on the strength of the vinegar), salt to taste, seal, boiling hot, in glass cans. I always sterilize the cans.
