NO POLICE INTERFERENCE

Power Not Yet Granted for Any Action Against Profiteers.

John Clark, a merchant of Bothwell, has made an interesting discovery con-cerning the high cost of living in Can-ada. He explained to The Advertiser cerning the high cost of living in Canada. He explained to The Advertiser that he has been in the habit of purchasing his supplies of bacon from a Canadian company of meat curers for many months, and recently he has had to pay 51 cents a pound.

Then, a few days ago, he was prompted by curlosity to go to Detroit and inquire about the wholesale prices of the product there. To his astonishment, he found that he could buy the same quality of bacon for 40 cents a pound. Mr. Clark ordered a quantity of the bacon and when it was delivered to his store and the duty paid, he found that the total cost per pound only amounted to 44 cents.

All food profiteers do not own cold storages, nor do they live very far from the city. Food barons have nothing on some cafe owners of this city. This has been plainly shown by the action of these proprietors in raising their rotes for Fair week because they were sure that they would get all the trade that they could handle.

Not utnli Wednesday, Farmers' Day, did this action taken place. There are signs that the proprietors came to an understanding on the matter, for they raised the prices simultaneously.






