Get the Railway Commission to Suspend an Order in Case of a Dangerous Crossing on C. N. R.

As several complaints had been received by The World from the citizens of Clarke Township, Durham County, against a recent order of the Federal Railway Commission, a re-porter went down to Newcastle to investigate. The facts learned are giv-

vestigate. The facts learned are given below:

Half a mile from Starkville on the Camadian Northern line (Toronto to Ottawa) there will be a very dangerous highway crossing, if the plans of the railway, approved by the commission, are carried out. This road, crossing the track, is used considerably. Half a mile from this crossing a station is being built at Starkville, and when the line is completed the road will be used almost as much as a main road. North of the track the road runs thru a thick bush; there is also a curve at this point, so that an approaching train could not be seen for more than one hundred yards. The Canadian Northern, seeing the necessity for a subway, included it in their plans approved by the commission February 15, 1910, and a copy of the order granting the subway was sent to the township. This was satisfactory to the council. In June, a petition framed by Harding, a Canadian Northern engineer, was taken around for signatures from carefully selected members of the community, and it is on this patition the whole trouble hinges.

From a canvass of those who signed

on this patition the whole trouble hinges.

From a canvass of those who signed the petition, it appears that it was in favor of a station at Starkville and a grade crossing, instead of the subway. Those who signed the petition say that they were told that if they did not sign a railway station would not be built at Starkville. Others who signed the petition say that they were told that they could sign for a station alone. This petition, which was handed to the less intelligent citizens in the vicinity of Starkville, received thirty signatures.

The course for this petition to have taken was thru the municipal council to the railway commission, but instead of this being done, it was sent direct to Ottawa, and not one of the council heard a word about it until the following order from the commissioners was received on the 20th inst.:

"Upon the report of an engineer of the board approving of the said plan and profile, and upon reading the petition of the residents of the Township of Clarke, it is ordered that the applicant company (C.N.R.) be, and is fiereby granted leave to construct on its railway across the said public road a grade level crossing between lots 10 and 11, concession 4, in the said township. And it is further ordered that the order of the board, authorizing the construction of a subway across the said public road at Station 990-67 be, and it hereby is, rescinded. (Sgd.) D'Area. and it hereby is, rescinded. (Sgd.) D'-

Arcy Scott, assistant chief commis-When the council received this communication, the reeve. A. Powers, called a special meeting and it was decided to place the affair in his hand. He wired the commission, asking them to suspend operations at the crossing un-til the matter could be discussed. The commissioners replied asking for par-ticulars of the case.

The reeve wrote giving the people's side. He pointed out that an engineer had reported a subway practicable, that a largely signed petition of residents had been presented against a grade crossing, that the C. N. R. bad wanted the subway height reduced to 12 feet, that the council had agreed to 12½ feet if the company would accept responsibility for any damages, which the company had refused. The second petition had been signed because of a threat not to erect a station at Stark-ville. Chief Engineer Stewart of the railway board, had told a deputation on April 21, that the subway order would not be varied.
