

CANADIAN FLAGS IN WESTMINSTER

Dean of Westminster Makes Reference to Colors on Wolfe's Monument.

London, July 15.—In connection with the appeal which has been issued by the dean of Westminster for £250,000 to save the abbey from falling into complete decay, the dean makes an interesting reference to the association of Canadian troops with the abbey during the war.

"The account of the abbey in war time," says the dean, "would be complete without a mention of the Canadian battalions and their colors. Being suddenly appealed to as to whether we could shelter their colors in the abbey while some artillery went to the front, I gladly consented, on condition that the transfer was carried out with a regular service of prayer and worship. This was readily approved of. And so, to a long story short, we soon had a whole series of services at which the officers and N.C.O.s of Canadian battalions committed their colors into our keeping, and we laid them on the high altar with a short solemn service. We afterwards, in the presence of the officers and N.C.O.s, deposited the colors upon the monument of General Wolfe. After the armistice, one after the other the officers of these battalions came back to claim their colors. Once again the colors lay upon the altar, and were restored with an office of prayer and thanksgiving. Most of the dealers apparently consisted of hedging for rural owners of new crop wheat. Absence of speculation was ascribed to the heavy margins required as a precaution against possible wild fluctuations. Clear, cool, dry weather likely to avert black rust damage was the chief bullish factor.

REDS FORCE PASSAGE OF THE VILYA RIVER

London, July 15.—Russian Bolshevik forces have forced their way across the Vilya River, in the province of Vilna, on the north, and have driven the Poles out of the city of Kamensk Podolski, on the southern end of the Polish front, according to an official statement issued in Moscow yesterday and received here by cable.

London, July 15.—(By Canadian Associated Press.)—The clause in the Finance Bill repealing the land values duty, the cause of much agitation when imposed by Premier Lloyd George, was carried in the commons yesterday, and the occasion was marked by an unprecedentedly riotous demonstration.

DECLINE IN WHEAT PRICES IN CHICAGO

Resumption of Trading in Futures Is Without Sensational Features.

Chicago, July 15.—Re-establishment of future delivery trading in wheat eclipsed all other happenings today on the board of trade. After the close officials of the exchange expressed themselves as gratified at the comparative equilibrium that wheat prices showed and with which ordinary business methods were resumed after a war upset of nearly three years. The net result in values was a decline of 1-2 to 4-12 cents as compared with opening figures. December wheat finishing at \$2.70 1/2 and March at \$2.74. Corn closed 2-7-8 and net result lower, oats off 3-4 to 5-8 cents and provisions down 1/4 to 7/8 cents.

WONNIPPEG GRAIN MARKET

Winnipeg, July 15.—Wheat closed 1/4 down, October 1/2 and December 1/4 lower. Barley, 20 lower for July and 1/4 down for October; December 1/4 lower. Flax, 8 lower for July and 1/4 lower for October.

MONTEAL PRODUCE MARKET

Montreal, July 15.—The cash grain market is quiet, with an easy market in sympathy with declines at the Chicago and Winnipeg markets. The market for firm wheat is falling off in production and the steady market for baled hay has no change in price.

EGG MARKET VERY FIRM

Ottawa, July 15.—The situation continues very firm. Ontario truck shippers report paying 3 1/2 to 4 cents and making sales of straight receipts 4 1/2 to 5 1/2 cents returnable; flats, 6 1/2 to 7 1/2 cents; in one instance 8 1/2 to 9 1/2 cents.

WHOLESALE FRUITS AND VEGETABLES

Strawberries and raspberries were not shipped in nearly so heavily yesterday as on Wednesday and the quality was very much better, so prices were firmer. Strawberries selling at 15c to 20c per box, and raspberries at 20c to 35c per box. The other domestic fruits kept about stationary in prices, according to quality. Blueberries came in more freely and were cheaper, selling at \$2 to \$3 per 11-quart basket. Apples—Two more cars of apples arrived, and sold at lower prices, selling at \$1.25 to \$1.50 per 11-quart basket. Green peas—Choice quality green peas will sell fairly well, but the bulk of the crop is still in the hands of the growers, and not good varieties, either, so they are a glut on the market, buyers refusing to take them at any price.
