

THEY'D SWALLOW ROOSEVELT IF IT WOULD HELP THEM

"Stand Pat" Lane Ducks
Ready to Do Anything to
Elect Themselves to Con-
gress at the Fall
Elections.

BUT T.R. MUST PROMISE FIRST NOT TO "BUTT IN"

Would Support Him for Presi-
dent in 1916 if He Will Not
Oppose Them for Re-
election.

WASHINGTON, May 23.—Some
stand-pat Republican Congressmen
who went down to defeat with Taft
two years ago are willing to take
Roosevelt as their candidate in 1916.
They are willing with several "ifs."
The first one is that Roosevelt does
not jeopardize their chances for elec-
tion for congress this fall by making
personal attacks upon them and jour-
neying into their districts and stirring
up opposition which would, without
the Roosevelt personal punch, be a
negligible quality.

These candidates were defeated by
Democrats, owing to Bull Moose op-
position, but will try again. Roosevelt,
they admit, is available presidential
timber for 1916. If Roosevelt keeps
his hands off them and does not bring
about their defeat, they will follow
the colonel and his presidential boom
without a wink and will not only stand
loyal but will get out and hustle for
the national ticket. If the colonel takes
the warpath as Bull Moosers desire
and, they will not only fight him now
but fight him for the nomination two
years hence.

It is freely predicted that should
the colonel take the stump in the
various congressional districts this
fall for the Bull Moosers he will have a
bolt on his hands should he capture
the Republican presidential nomi-
nation. Republicans of the anti-Roosevelt
stamp say they will not organize
a new party but will go over to the
Democrats.

There will be no feeling of resent-
ment if Colonel Roosevelt invades
Pennsylvania in behalf of Gifford Pin-
chot should the latter have the Bull
Moose nomination in that state for the
senatorship. These stand-patters
claim that the stronger fight Pinchot
puts up against A. Mitchell Palmer or
any other Democrat, it makes Pen-
nsylvania's path that much the brighter
and will practically insure his elec-
tion to the senate.

Soft Pedal for Roosevelt.
The wise men in Roosevelt's camp
appreciate the situation so far as the
Republican party is concerned. It is
rumored that the more level-headed
ones, those opposed to Perkins and
Pinchot, will counsel that the colonel
on the soft pedal this fall and that they
will further counsel, it is said, that
he go to Europe for a spell. They ad-
mit that Roosevelt can only win as
the regular Republican nominee, and
they want to see him nominated by
his old party.

Every Republican candidate, whe-
ther he is now a sitting member or
not, has his eye on New York and is
waiting anxiously for official utterances
from the colonel.

When the colonel speaks there will
be "something doing." The old-time
Taft men are Taft men only in name.
Today they have no leader, and will
bully to Roosevelt if he will give the
Bull Moosers the go-by and carry them
again into their official positions.

Republicans and Progressive Re-
publican senators and members of the
house are doing most of the harmony
talk. They realize that they are in
danger of defeat by Democrats if the
warring factions of the grand old
party are not brought together by the
November election.

Senator Cummings of Iowa, Jones, of
Washington and Brewster, of Kansas,
belong to the group that would like
to get Taft and Roosevelt people into
one camp. In Kansas Senator Brewster
is not confronted with strong Demo-
cratic opposition, but he has that
aggressive Bull Moose Representative
Victor Murdock, on his trail. Similar
situations exist in almost every state
where there are contests this year.

Republicans have not forgiven Mr.
Roosevelt for dividing their party. In
Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, and other
states in the middle west they are
bitter against Roosevelt, but they want
to win.

Senator Cummings and La Follette
think of being candidates for the presi-
dency in 1916. Mr. La Follette is not
reconciled to Mr. Roosevelt.

Ready to Howl Calamity.
Many stand-pat Republicans are
waiting and watching. Their one hope
is that business conditions will grow
bad so they can start a calamity howl.
A year ago Senator Gallinger, an old
time Republican, was ready to quit
the senate, believing the Progressives
might keep him from being re-elected.
He will, it is said, within a few days,
announce his candidacy, and ask for
the support on the ground that he is
a protective tariff Republican of the
old school. He does not think the
Bull Moose will interfere now.


Some Republicans occupy middle
ground. Senator Lodge, for instance,

has been classed as a Taft Republican.
Senator Clapp predicted that Col.
Roosevelt will be nominated by the
Republicans and elected.

STOCKHOLM, May 23.—It is gen-
erally believed in Court circles that
the engagement which is announced
between Princess Marie, the divorced

Amelie, of Portugal, will be follow-

ed very quickly by their marriage.

BERLIN, May 23.—German officers

future be subject to instant dismissal
from the army with the loss of their
pensions.
