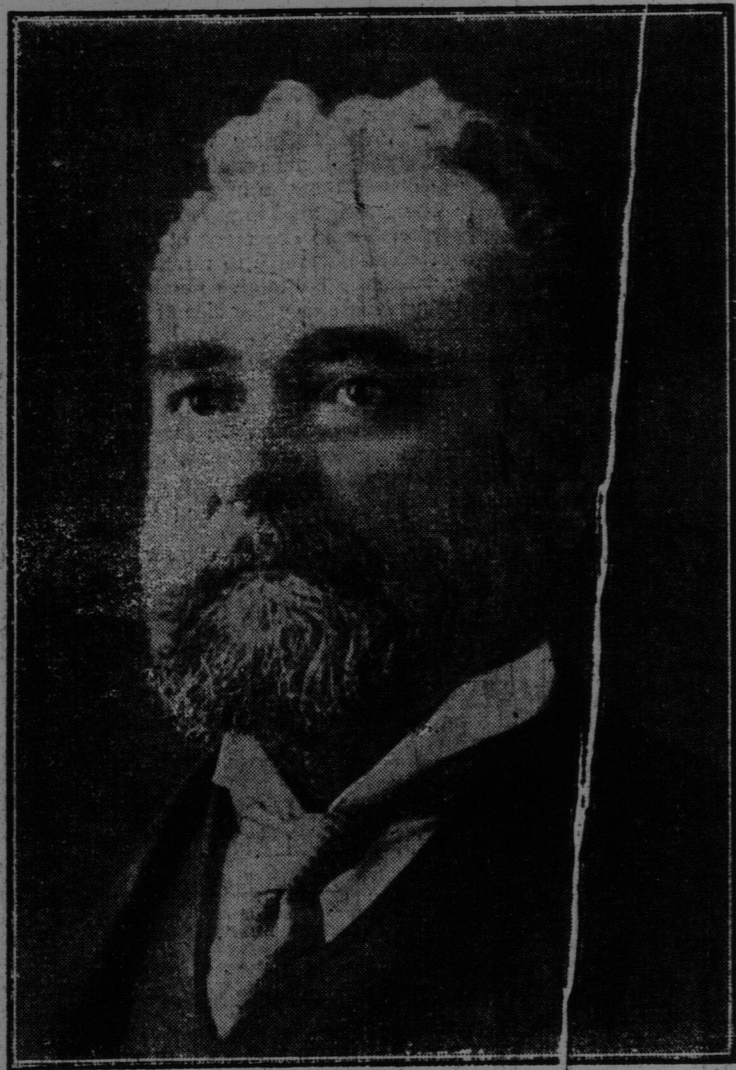

A PENNSYLVANIA VILLAGE BURNED BY FOREST FIRES

Village of Lincolnville Practically Wiped Out—Survivor of Metz Relief Train Disaster Gives Thrilling Account of Tragedy—Women and Children Roasted to Death.

Titusville, Pa., Oct. 17.—Lincolnville, a village near here, is being consumed by flames that started from a forest fire. The blaze is beyond control, and help has been summoned from nearby places. Word was received here by telephone last night that several houses have already been burned, and there is little hope of saving buildings still standing.

MR. POWELL APPEALS TO RACE PREJUDICE

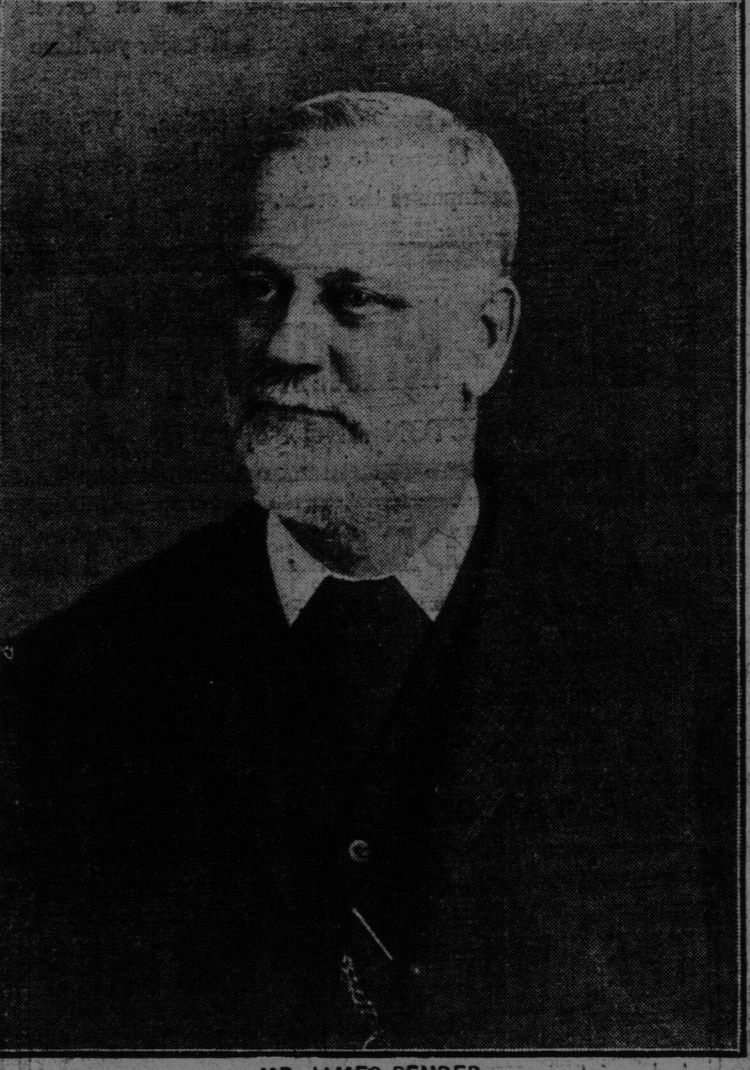
