

NEWS AND VIEWS OF SPORT

Those agitating the formation of an all-Canadian baseball league have been at work in Ottawa the past two days sizing up the possibilities of the Capital as an organized ball town.

The proposition is, said Mr. Payne, "to form a five club league made up of Montreal, Toronto, Hamilton, London and Ottawa. It would be affiliated with the national commission. No attempt will be made to organize this season, but I think next year you will see Ottawa represented in a first class league with a first class team."

It has been intimated the Ottawa Electric railway may aid in backing the club and all games will be played at the company's new park in Holland avenue. Mr. Payne states the league would probably work on the same principle as the Eastern, that of pooling all gates so that no one town would be a heavy loser.

The sensational trotter of the day in Europe, and probably the best one ever bred there, is a French one called Jockey. At Modena, Italy, on May 3, he trotted a mile in 2:09.14, on a half mile track, and at Bologna, one week later, he won a race in 2:11.2 and 2:10. No other trotter of French stock ever displayed anything like the speed shown by Jockey, and a good many horsemen have been disposed to suspect that he was an American horse masquerading under another name than his own.

WOODSTOCK WON

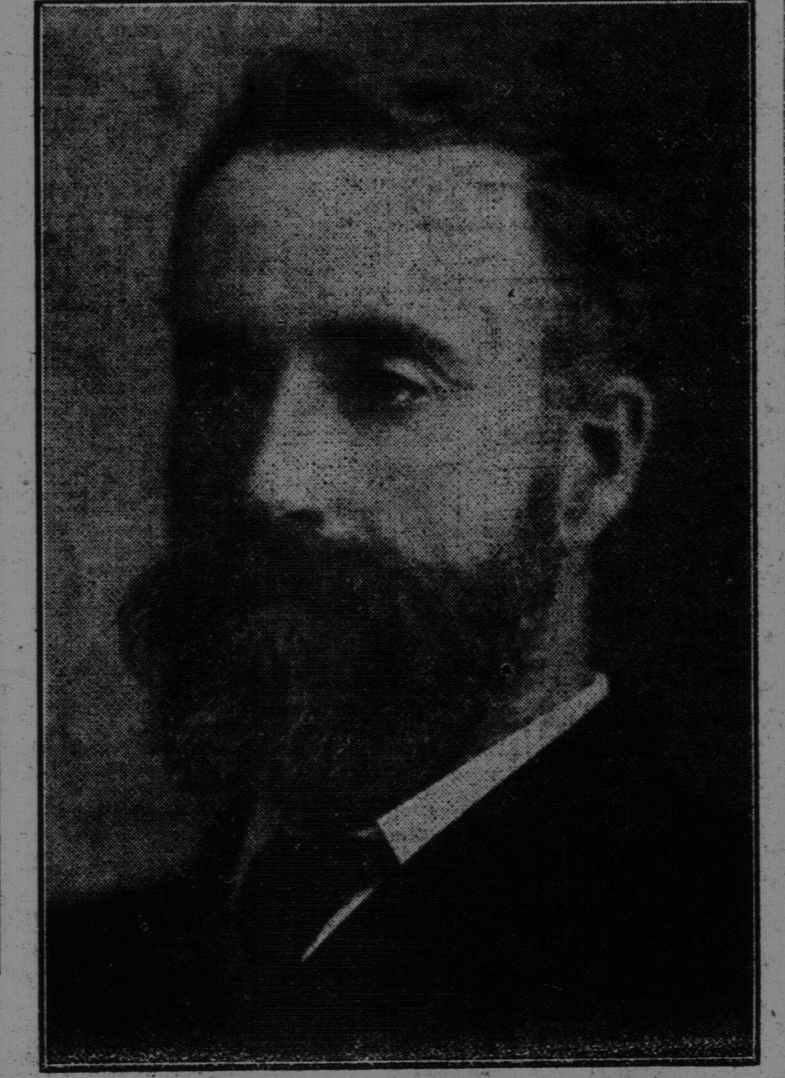
