

MAYOR WHITE IS FIRST BUYER IN SEALS CAMPAIGN

Called on by Anti-T.B. Association Member; Lauds Objects of Drive

SEES POSSIBILITY OF ERADICATION

Wishes Organization Success in Achievement of Object Desired

Mayor White had the honor this morning of purchasing the first lot of Christmas seals which are being distributed by the Saint John Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis, and incidentally he handed the work which is being carried out by this organization in its battle against the disease.

MAYOR'S STATEMENT

At the same time, Mayor White dictated the following: "Among the most dreaded enemies of the human race, there are two which are outstanding. I allude to tuberculosis on the one hand and cancer on the other.

"There is, however, a very great difference in the defence which we may offer against these invaders, for while the treatment of cancer is still greatly in the experimental stage and some scientific progress has been made, very little practical result has yet been achieved. It is far different with the treatment of tuberculosis. An intelligent knowledge of some of the facts connected with this disease will do very much to aid in its entire eradication.

"It is, in the first instance, due to the growth in the individual of a vegetable organism termed the bacillus tuberculosis. If, therefore, these enemies may be prevented from entrance or destroyed after entrance, theoretically at least, the disease would no longer exist.

"It has been found that a proper course of life in which the surroundings are made as sanitary and hygienic as possible will not only lessen the danger of infection, but will so improve and fortify the resisting powers of the individual that he is assured of victory over his enemy.

"It will be seen, then, how very important it is for the human race generally to understand this subject thoroughly and to carry out the precautions suggested.

"We have in the city of Saint John, the Saint John Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis. Its object is to carry out the very things which have been mentioned. It is in need of funds and in the sale of a number of little seals it hopes to raise a considerable amount of money to enable it to carry on this philanthropic work. It is to be hoped that this appeal, so small to each individual, will be responded to in such great numbers that their object may be achieved."

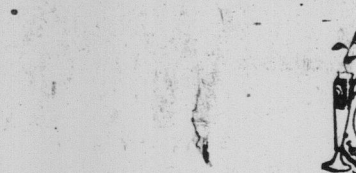
Time Approaching When Great Men Should be Honored, Says MacFarlane

Canadian Press. FREDERICTON, N. B., Dec. 1.—"I believe the time is rapidly approaching when we in this province should honor our great men," declared A. S. MacFarlane, past president, addressing the members of the Fredericton Society of Saint Andrew last evening on the occasion of the gathering of some 70 members of the society in honor of Saint Andrew's Day.

"Why is it that there is no monument here to Sir Howard Douglas, one of the greatest governors this province has ever had," continued the speaker, as he drew attention to the manner in which the memories of Scotland's national figures have been preserved, to Sir Leonard Tilley, one of the Fathers of Confederation, who lived in our midst, or to the highly esteemed and honored father of our president, who practically wrote our Free Schools' Act," he concluded, referring to the late William Crockett, former chief superintendent of education.

AMATEUR CHANGES ARE PUT FORWARD

Amendments to Amateur Definition by Judge Jackson Sent Here

The Times-Star is in receipt of two long communications from the Alberta branch of the A. A. U. of C., respecting a proposal by Judge Jackson regarding change in the definition of an amateur. He proposes changing Section B of the present definition. Just now, this reads as follows: "An athlete who has completed a year against a professional for a prize or where gate receipts are charged or a collection taken up, except as may be specially provided for, or has entered in any competition under other than his own name, shall be ineligible for registration and competition as an amateur. Such an athlete may be eligible for re-instatement."

The Jackson amendment has the following in its place: "(B) All others shall be considered eligible for registration and competition in the Union and its affiliated bodies, unless otherwise provided in the By-laws of this Union, adopted under this Constitution."

(Note: Clauses (D), (E) and (F) regarding instructors were left as amateurs. (An athlete shall not lose his amateur status by competing with or against a professional in cricket, golf or indoor bowling.) But this clause shall apply to boxing, swimming, wrestling and track and field events while under the direct control of the A. A. U. of C., or any of its branches, and such other lines of sport as may be specifically designated by the A. A. U. of C., and directly controlled by it, and further it may apply to athletes under the control of any of its affiliated bodies and then only if any such affiliated body makes provision to that effect. Further, this clause shall not be construed as part of the definition of an amateur of the A. A. U. of C. in any other connection.)

Discussion on this matter in view of the annual meeting here next week will be given in tomorrow's Times-Star.

LEG BROKEN WHEN POLE SNAPS OFF

Ralph Sutton, Fredericton, Painfully Injured—Reported as Comfortable

Special to The Times-Star. FREDERICTON, N. B., Dec. 1.—A very distressing accident occurred in Queen street this morning shortly before 10 o'clock when Ralph Sutton, an employe of the New Brunswick Telephone Co. Ltd., fell with a pole and sustained a very severe fracture of the left leg between ankle and knee. The injured man was rushed to Victoria Hospital for treatment. He is reported resting as well as could be expected. Sutton climbed a pole in front of the New Brunswick Liquor Commissioners' premises and began work on the cross arms strapping himself to the pole in the customary manner. The pole was completely rotted through at the base and evidently was supported merely by the wires. Sutton's weight broke the pole off and it crashed to the pavement. The man was helpless because of the strap about him. Those who saw the pole fall expected nothing but the death of the man. By-standers rushed to his aid and it was found that his left leg was broken so badly that it was turned over. The N. B. Telephone Company's truck, which was nearby, was used to rush the injured man to the hospital.

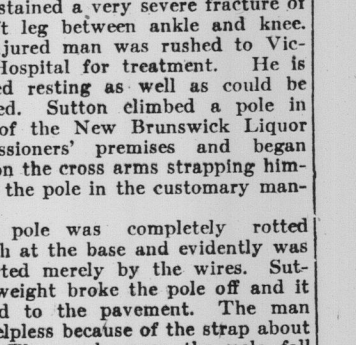
