Montreal, Sept. 5.—Eight athletes of the Montreal Amateur A. C. track and field club have been selected to represent the club at Halifax on the 15th instant in the Canadian track and field meet. They are W. S. Antill, mile and half mile; J. M. McKechnie, half mile; W. Fuller, sprint; D. J. Cable, quarter mile; A. Cameron and D. Johnson, quarter mile; J. O'Neill, broad jump and sprint; and B. B. Harris, half mile.

These men have been selected from an original dozen, all of whom, it was felt, were of sufficient ability to warrant their going to Halifax, but for financial reasons the number had to be cut to eight.

REPORT PLEASES WELFARE BOARD

Eminent Jurists Give Views on Penal Reform to Bar Association.

That a group of fourteen eminent jurists should draw up a report for presentation to the Canadian Bar Association on the Administration of Criminal Justice, which embodies proposed reforms and ameliorations which are popularly attributed to faddists and theorists, came as a pleasing surprise to board members of the Canadian Prisoners' Welfare Association, who met Thursday to consider the report in question.

The fly in the ointment was the fact that, according to a dispatch from Vancouver, the benches of the British Columbia Law Society are sending a special emissary to oppose certain principles enunciated in the report, particularly the extension and development of the probation and parole systems and the institution of what is known as the indeterminate sentence, all of which reforms, in the opinion of the Pacific province lawyers, have weakened the administration of justice.

The Second Report of the Committee on the Administration of Criminal Justice, which runs to sixteen pages, contains proposed amendments to the Criminal Code, and other statutes, together with proposals for reform of prison conditions, treatment of prisoners and prevention of crime recommended either unanimously or by majority vote, or forwarded as open questions.

In a general statement the principle of penal reformers is laid down that, "we are now, without losing sight of the necessity for adequate punishment, realizing that reformation of the criminal is a much higher ideal." To this is added the statement: "It has been found that 80 to 90 per cent. of offenders who are placed on probation or parole live up to the required standard."

Probation and Parole.

The report of the committee was endorsed by the board of the Prisoners' Welfare Association as a whole, and in considering its recommendation, special emphasis was laid upon certain sections which would naturally appeal to such a body. The extension of the probation system in the criminal courts and of the parole system for those in penal institutions, it was contended by C. P. W. A. members, forms the essential framework of any reforms in the treatment of offenders against the law; hence they readily approved the recommendations of the Bar Association's committee that a probation act should be passed in each province, also an Extra Mural Act, and that the system of parole in each province should be established as apart from the Dominion system already operating.

Another recommendation was to the effect that there should be an act to provide a Public Defender in criminal cases, thought this had not been agreed upon by a majority vote and had therefore been sent on for consideration of the association. The C. P. W. A. expressed the hope that this project would commend itself to the profession as the need for such an offer was very evident according to their experience.

Wages in Prison.

Among the most urgent of reforms in the opinion of the Prisoners' Welfare Association was that of the payment of wages to prisoners.

URGES SEARCH FOR LOST ARCTIC PARTY

Walker Suggests Two Expeditions to Converge on Wrangel Island

Toronto, Sept. 4.—Efforts are being made to secure the co-operation of the Siberian Government in ascertaining the fate of Allan Crawford, the Toronto boy, and his two companions, who started across the ice from Wrangel Island in January of this year and have not been heard of since. John Anderson, secretary of the Stefansson Arctic Exploration and Development Company, said today that a cable had already been sent to Mr. Stefansson instructing him to make the necessary arrangements. Up to noon Professor J. T. Crawford had received no direct word from Harold Noyce respecting the possible tragedy that befell his son.

From V. Stefansson, sponsor of the ill-fated Arctic expedition, however, who is now in England, a cable expressing condolence has been received by Professor Crawford. Stefansson's message reads:

"Deepest sympathy over terrible news. Stefansson."

Despatches quote Stefansson as expressing a slight hope that Crawford and his two companions may yet turn up alive. The distance from Wrangel Island to the mainland is about 110 miles, and could be covered in less than three weeks, but there would be 700 miles or more still to be covered before the party would be in touch with the world.

Sir Edmund Walker, who has been associated with Stefansson in the polar expeditions of the explorer, and who has given him considerable financial assistance, says that he has not given up hope of finding the little party alive. He suggests sending search parties to the north in an endeavor to locate them.

"The most logical way," said Sir Edmund, "would be to send two parties, one to the southeast coast of Siberia and the other to Nome, Alaska, both to work towards Wrangel Island. Sir Edmund suggests that a relief party should be organized in Toronto and supported by public subscription."
