

HON. MR. KING'S WRITTEN TO ABOUT THE EXTENSION OF GRAIN CONVEYORS

Commissioner Bullock Takes Up Matter of City Financing Work

A discussion on the need for increased harbor facilities at this port and the tripartite agreement featured a Common Council meeting this morning.

Mayor Fisher reported that he had received from Mrs. V. S. MacLaughlin, secretary of the British Columbia Women's Institute, a letter of thanks for a suggested resolution drafted by himself and R. E. Armstrong, secretary of the Board of Trade, urging the extension of grain conveyors.

Commissioner Frink said it was very nice to hear these resolutions but he would like to ask how the Port of St. John was equipped to handle a larger portion of the overseas trade than the harbor and the extension of grain conveyors.

During the ministry of Hon. J. D. Hazen there had been expended some \$8,000,000 under this agreement. Resolutions were all right to listen to but they do not get you anywhere; cold coin gets you somewhere.

Commissioner Bullock said there was a very large grain crop in Canada this year and if additional conveyors were provided more of it could go through St. John.

He had taken the matter up again with Hon. Mr. King and if the city financed the building of the conveyors, the Government would reimburse.

Commissioner Frink said Montreal was in the business metropolis of the Dominion and it followed, as a matter of course, the political metropolis. That, he said, explains the whole thing.

Mayor Fisher said he was expecting to hear soon that the committee dealing with harbor matters, appointed by the citizens' committee, was ready to report but if the council could do anything to impress on the Gov-
