

### WOMEN UNDER OVERTURNED TAXI URGE DRIVER TO HURRY AND LIFT CAR OFF THEIR HEADS

Two young women and a chauffeur had a narrow escape from death shortly after 8 o'clock last night when the steering gear of a taxi cab in which they were riding broke in front of 263 West Forty-third street and threw the machine into an excavation fifteen feet below the street level. George Barnett, the chauffeur, told the police that the young women, who were in evening gowns, crawled unhurt from the wreckage of the machine when it landed bottom upward, and refused to reveal their identity.

"When I climbed out of the wreckage," he said, "I found that the top had been crushed in, and after I had helped them to crawl out they declared they had enjoyed the experience and were going to see the performance at the Music Box Theatre anyway."

When he asked if they were hurt one of them said: "Don't worry about us. It was like looping the loop." Then they brushed their gowns, he said, and hurried away through the rear of the excavation.

As the taxi cab on its way to the theatre passed the Ascension Memorial Protestant Episcopal Church, which adjoins the excavation, Barnett heard the knuckle of his steering apparatus break. He tried to stop the machine with his hand but it swerved into a car standing in front of the church, and then bounced on to the sidewalk. "Then it bounced forward again off the side, walk into the excavation."

Barnett freed himself through a small space left in front of the car when the engine crashed down on the top. "When I got out," he said, "I called the women, and one of them said: 'It's all right. Lift your car off our heads.' They landed in the space between the rear seat and the front of the car. 'I never saw such women. Even when I was tugging at the crushed door to get them out, they

## KEEP AUSTRALIA WHITE COUNTRY

Lord Northcliffe's Advice on Departure for Philippines.

London, Oct. 3.—An urgent appeal to Australians to keep Australia a white country and a strong warning that unless white immigration was encouraged the country was likely to be swamped by Asiatics, whether the Australians were willing or not, was issued by Lord Northcliffe at Sydney when he left there on Saturday for the Philippines. Remarking that Australia had never known war on her own soil, he told the Australians that they might, forever prevent that experience if they acted wisely, quickly and unselfishly in promoting immigration in sufficient numbers to make themselves safe from invasion, which they certainly were not now doing. He urged Australians to devise immediately a bold and constructive immigration policy and assured them that British investors would support the right sort of scheme, which would attract suitable immigrants from Great Britain.

## WHOLE FAMILY AT CHURCH TOGETHER

An Experiment to be Tried at St. David's Presbyterian Church.

Commencing on next Sunday an experiment will be tried in St. David's church which may be of considerable utility in the life of the congregation. This is in furtherance of efforts which have been made for some time to make the morning service one at which the whole family might be present. An objection by some parents is that their children are too young to attend and it is to meet this that the experiment is to be tried for the balance of the season. During the singing of the hymns before the sermon all children under the age of nine years will be allowed to pass into the Sunday school room where they will be taken charge of by capable leaders who will keep the little ones interested with Bible stories and the singing of children's hymns.

## SOME 6,000 IN STRIKE ON N. Y. WATER FRONT

New York, Oct. 3.—Leaders of the 6,000 longshoremen who went on strike at the transatlantic steamship piers on Saturday in protest against the new wage scale yesterday declared their grievances concerned not only reduced wages and the resumption of the forty-eight-hour week but the fact that their overtime pay had been abolished on Saturdays.

The walkout, according to Joseph

Ryan, vice-president of the International Longshoremen's Association, was participated in by only nine of the twenty-nine local unions. Officials of the organization declared the majority of the longshoremen in the port had accepted a wage reduction from \$1 to sixty-five cents an hour, and from \$1.20 to \$1 an hour for overtime.
