HOCKEY.
Maritime Trophy.

W. Morton, of the firm of Morton & Thomson of Halifax, has issued a set of rules to govern a trophy donated by them and originally intended to be competed for by Halifax teams in the city hockey league. They later altered the intention and are now offering it as a trophy to be emblematic of the championship of the Maritime provinces. Last year the Wanderers of Halifax won the championship of the city league and were to have played off with Antigonish for the trophy. But weather conditions were unfavorable and the match will be played next Monday in the Halifax arena. It is expected that the winners will then play off with Sussex, who claim the championship of New Brunswick.

Stadium For Detroit.

Detroit, Jan. 4.—An athletic stadium with 70,000 seating capacity will be built on the University of Detroit, an official

of the institution announced. Work is to start immediately, and one section of 30,000 seats will be ready for use next October, according to present plans. The stadium will be located at the north-western terminus of the city, where the university is to erect new buildings to care for its various branches. The cost was not announced.

AFGHAN PRINCE LOVES TO PLAY

Heir to Throne Getting Westernized at Paris School.

Perturbed at first because they were expected occasionally to hurry, whereas in their own country the sign and rank of nobility is a grave and stately slow, thirty-seven young Afghans, all sons of dignitaries are gradually settling down to European habits at a well known Paris school, the Lycée Michelet. The youngest of the party, whose age range from ten years to twenty, is Hidarullah Khan, son of the Emir of Afghanistan, who will mount the throne himself one day "if he proves worthy" for in Afghanistan qualifications additional to those of birth are demanded of a ruler.

The principles of Afghan upbringing are illustrated in the attitude of the future Emir's comrades. They do not pay him the least deference. He is a pensive child, who listens with a quaint gravity to French phrases he does not understand, but his dominating wish is to be out in the playgrounds with the other pupils.

The boys have already shown a fondness for European games, especially football, cricket and hockey.

One of the school authorities' troubles has been the need of a place for these boys to play. When the moment for prayer comes they kneel or prostrate themselves at any spot where they happen to be, whether on the terrace, in the corridors or in the garden. Soon a prayer room will be ingested and ready for them, and also a special chamber for their ablutions.

A separate dormitory has been reserved for them, and a separate study, where two former students at the school of oriental languages come to give them lessons and watch over their diet.

With European learning they are acquiring European customs. Already they have learned that to hustle does not necessarily indicate plebeian origin, as it would in their own country. Also, despite the fact that it is helle in Afghanistan to keep the head covered, they have acquired the habit of doffing their astrakhan caps when they wish to show particular courtesy to European friends.

**BELGIAN HEIR-APPARENT
ENGAGED TO YOLANDA**

So Says a Brussels Rumor, Unconfirmed at Italian and Belgian Courts.

Rome, Jan. 4.—The Temple publishes a dispatch to a Paris paper which says that the visit of the King and Queen of the Belgians on Jan. 23 will be made the occasion of officially announcing the engagement of Princess Yolanda to the Duke of Brabant.

All the best informed personages in court circles here profess ignorance of such a plan as affecting the Princess Yolanda; but it is well known that there has been talk of the Italian Crown Prince marrying the Princess Marie Jose, sister of the Duke of Brabant.

The Duke of Brabant, who is twenty years old, served with distinction in the Belgian Army during the war, and was the recipient of the Croix de Guerre and the Grand Cross of the Legion of Honor from the French government. He accompanied his father and mother on a tour of the United States in 1919. He is also known as a prince Leopold and is the heir apparent to the Belgian throne. In 1920, traveling incognito, he made a tour of a number of South American countries. This is not the first time that Princess Yolanda has been reported engaged. As early as 1916 there were
