Reviewed Year of Much Success in Kindergartens

A year of much success and great usefulness was reviewed by the Free Kindergarten Association at its annual meeting yesterday afternoon in the G. W. V. A. rooms, with Mrs. F. E. Holman, president, in the chair. Plans were made for the summer activities in connection with the exhibition.

The treasurer's report, which had been audited by Miss A. V. Sandall and Miss Grace W. Leavitt, showed that the association closed the year with a balance of \$198.38. The committee which has been soliciting subscriptions reported that there had been a generous response and funds from this source to date amounted to \$105.

It was decided to postpone the election of officers until the next meeting and to have the kindergarten opened again in the fall after the exhibition, as the teachers would be busy at the exhibition. For the special plant in connection with the exhibition it was decided to show the work of the children and that done by the graduating class of kindergarten teachers.

Reports were submitted from each of the kindergartens, telling also of the ways in which the kindergartens had helped in the homes of some of the children where there had been found to be need and distress.

The teachers at the kindergartens were as follows:—Willington row, Miss Lou Estey and Miss Elizabeth Stanley; Mabel Peters' kindergarten, Miss Ruth Manis and Miss Edie Macdonald; south end, Miss Edna Colwell and Miss Helen Bennett; Prince Edward street, Miss Winnifred Ross and Miss Florence Kienstead; north end, Miss Edith Stephens and Miss Dorothy Simonds; East St. John, to find a suitable building to be used as a kindergarten in West St. John, wrote that up to the present time he had not been successful in his search. The association has undertaken to provide teachers if a suitable building can be found.

Mayor McLellan had been written to ask that the association might have a day in October, and his permission having been given, he had been thanked.

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RUMOR OF BREAK WITH DRURY, NEWS TO J. J. MORRISON

Truro, N. S., June 27.—"It is news to me," replied J. J. Morrison, secretary of the United Farmers of Ontario, when interviewed today as to the truth of a rumor to the effect that he and Premier Drury of Ontario had had a break, and that Drury was to reorganize so as to take fire Liberals into his cabinet.

Mr. Morrison, who was here to attend the annual meeting of the United Farmers of Nova Scotia, said that such a reorganization would mean an election.

WOOLWORTH OWNER PROTESTS TAX RATE

Declares Assessment to be 25 Per Cent. Higher Than Building Worth Sell For—City to File Accounts.

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The petition of the owner asserts that the building is assessed for 25 per cent. more than it would be sold for at the present time, whereas the general custom is to assess for taxation purposes at less than the market value. The assessment on the land is alleged to be 67 per cent. more than the first assessment in 1911, although there has been a steady decline since in the value of realty. Under the rulings of the Federal taxation bureau there would be an allowance of 17 per cent. or \$1,300,000, for depreciation.

The papers state that 12,000 persons occupy the Woolworth building, and that 100,000 pass in and out daily, which causes "tremendous wear and tear."
