### MOTHER AND FOUR SONS HELD FOR ROBBERY

Truckman's Family Is Accused of \$80,000 Thefts of Goods in Transit Abroad.

(New York Times.)  
Angelina Salomone, thirty-six years old, of 282 Van Brunt street, Brooklyn, and her four boys, ranging from nine to fifteen years old, were arrested early yesterday morning on the charge of stealing goods worth between \$25,000 and \$80,000 from trucks.

Angelina Salomone, the husband, is the owner of a large trucking business and has been considered a wealthy man. He was lying at his home in a critical condition from pneumonia at the time his wife and four children were arrested. Salomone himself has also complained that he was being robbed.

Detectives Eason, McClann and Kenn of the Hamilton avenue station, who had received information implicating the family, kept watch Friday night and early yesterday morning on the barn in the rear of the Salomone home, where loaded trucks are frequently stored overnight. They saw the mother and her brood of young boys go to the barn, and when the burst in a door the detectives assert that they found several cases of goods opened and their contents unpacked. In the barn and in the Salomone house they found typewriters, heavy wooden blankets, stacks of cloth, manicure sets and other articles. They found the truckman dangerously ill and apparently ignorant of what had been taking place. He was not arrested.

An unusual device for covering the thefts of dry goods was discovered in connection with the case, according to the detectives. This was the use of transatlantic fences for disposing of the goods. The evidence gathered by the detectives indicated that it had been a regular practice to steal miscellaneous articles, to repack them promptly and ship them to jobbers in Italy and in Norway.

The mother was locked up at the Hamilton avenue station on the charge of grand larceny. The children's Society took charge of the five children—dominick, fifteen years; Joseph, thirteen years; Frank, twelve years; and Salvatore, nine years old.

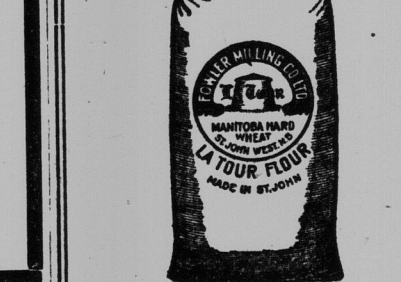

Anglican Clergymen Scores Some of Them Severely.

Toronto, Oct. 9.—"I do not hold that there is necessarily anything wrong in dancing," said Rev. Mr. Renison in a discussion on the question of dancing at the annual convention of the Anglican Young People's Association in St. James parish hall, "but it would require a great deal of charity to call modern dances good. Many of the so-called modern dances are nothing but an expression of the worst parts of the nature of the African aborigine."
