
DIED YESTERDAY.

PLUCKY ACT IN CHILD RESCUE

Reuben Carleton, Convalescent After Illness, Leaps Into Tide and Saves Boy

Reuben Carleton, who is employed with his father, grocer, in West St. John, performed a gallant act yesterday afternoon and saved the four-year-old son of George Peterson from drowning.

About four o'clock as the little chap was playing around the slip near the Driscoll lumber property, King street, he fell into the water. A rush call for help brought Mr. Carleton to the scene and he plunged into the chilly water of October to save the boy. The latter was going down for the last time but his brave rescuer reached him in time and brought him to shore.

An outstanding feature of the gallant act is that Mr. Carleton has been ill at his home for two weeks and is only now convalescing. He is being heartily commended for his brave action.

WHAT IS LEFT OF THE STEAMER MAY QUEEN

What remains of the former river steamer May Queen, now a charred and rusty mass of wood and iron, is beached in a slip at the Portland Rolling Mills plant, facing the harbor below the reversing falls, being dismantled.

The wreck, which was purchased by Captain Gilchrist, a former master of the steamer, was raised from the bottom of the river outside of Woodman and Miller's mill wharf, Milford, and towed to the Portland Rolling Mills where her machinery, etc., are being junked.

The hull was lying in twenty-two feet of water and W. A. Eagles was employed to raise her. After overcoming many difficulties he was successful and not only lifted her but also had her towed to the present location below the falls.

The May Queen was in winter quarters, and on February 4 was noticed to be settling in the water. That night she caught fire and was burned and the hull sank. The hull was later sold by the insurance companies interested, and Captain Gilchrist purchased it.

The flag of raising the hull was a difficult one and Mr. Eagles is being complimented for his good work.

REVERSES JUDGMENT IN SEPARATE SCHOOL CASE

Toronto, Oct. 24.—The first divisional court has upset Mr. Justice Cluthe's judgment in the Ottawa separate school case, in which he awarded the Ottawa separate school board certain amounts as against banks and the members of the school commission created by the Ontario government and set aside by the privy council, the latter having found that the commission was inoperative, and, therefore, ultra vires of the legislature.

"I would allow the appeals of the defendants with costs, reverse the judgment of the trial judge and substitute for it judgment dismissing the actions with costs and directing that judgment be entered for the commissioners on their counter claim with costs, and I would dismiss the appeal of the school board with costs," said Chief Justice Sir William Meredith and his colleagues concurred.

The commissioners counter-claimed to recover from the school board \$71,891.16, borrowed by the commissioners from the Bank of Ottawa and used by the commission in carrying on the schools.
