

## WOULD DRENCH LAND IN BLOOD

Call of Bolshevik Commander-in-Chief for Volunteers for Russian Army

London, Jan. 12.—The call of Enslin Krylenko, Bolshevik commander-in-chief, for volunteers for a Russian army, according to the Bolshevik telegraph agency at Petrograd, was issued in the form of an appeal to the soldiers and workmen, and as a reply to the German peace proposals. The appeal refers to Germany's rejection of the proposals framed previously and their open talk of annexation. In the event of a separate peace, the call declares that the Russian republic and its councils will be surrounded on all sides by enemies. "American and French financiers," he continues, "are lending money to provide war material for Kaledin. The German bourgeoisie are unprepared to use them as allies for stifling the Russian revolution. These are conditions which raise for the Russian peasants and workmen the whole question of the defence of the conquest achieved by the revolution and of the holy war against the bourgeoisie, not only of Russia, but of Germany, France and Great Britain. Should the bourgeoisie be victorious, they will take vengeance in the shape of the most cruel terror and torture, drenching the land with blood, and which would put in the shade the tortures inflicted by the satellites of the Czar. It may be that a holy war on the fronts as well as behind the lines stands before us as a terrible and unavoidable fate."

Krylenko explains that the old army is exhausted, and that a new one must be created with the Red Guard as a nucleus, and it must be subject to rigorous, revolutionary discipline. "Comrades," he says, "The people of Italy, Spain, France, Austria and Switzerland watch you with hope and await the call to battle against their bourgeoisie. Their soldiers will not march against revolutionary Russia. Enroll yourselves in the ranks of the people's guard and safeguard the revolution and socialism."

The appeal concludes by declaring that there will be no compulsion in recruiting, and appealing to the comrades in the Ukraine to respond to the call in order to defend liberty.

## ABOLITION OF PROPERTY QUALIFICATION

Calgary Probably To Seek Charter Amendment With This In View

MAYOR AND ALDERMEN

Edmonton to Ask For Power To Levy Part of the Cost of Running Municipal Election on the School Board

With the new approach of the session of the Alberta legislature, proposed charter amendments are engaging the attention of the cities of that province, and although the work is apparently undertaken with that eleventh-hour haste which city councils everywhere approach this task, some interesting proposals are being made. The commissioners of the city of Edmonton recently called for suggestions from superintendents of departments and other city officials. Among those offered by the city clerk which it appears, may be adopted and may find favor in other cities. In the view of this official, the school board should pay its share of the expenses incurred in the holding of the annual municipal elections, and he suggests an amendment which would provide for a division of these costs as follows: Three-fifths to be paid from the civic revenue controlled by the council, two-sixths by the public school board, and one-sixth by the separate school board.

The legislative committee of the Calgary city council is more ambitious and may ask for more radical changes. Among these it is not unlikely that the abolition of the property qualification for the mayor and aldermen may be included. At the present time candidates for either of these offices must appear on the last revised assessment roll as owners of property of a minimum value of \$500, free of all encumbrances. The council after some discussion, decided that it should be enough if the candidate is a ratepayer, and in accordance with the view of the laborites and some others in this city, it should be enough if the candidate is an elector.

Some Criticism.

The Morning Albertan is not satisfied with the proposal to reduce the property qualification and strongly urges a complete abolition. "The federal candidates whom we elect," says the paper, "may have property, but that is not a qualification for such a position. The premier of Canada does not need property qualifications for his high position," and it adds, with evidently just intent: "This resolution is a step in the great as that of any alderman in the city council." The Albertan continues: "The members of the school board do not need property qualifications and the class of candidates for the school board is quite good as far as the school board is concerned. It is drawn from the middle and lower classes of the community. A man may have a million dollars in Victory bonds and another million dollars in the hands of the bank, but he is not a ratepayer, and he is not a citizen. He is a man of no use to the city council."

Another possible amendment to the Edmonton charter does not need the suggestion of Mayor Evans. The mayor thinks that if the city does not already possess the power, it should be specifically enabled to levy sufficient taxes to cover any anticipated tax arrears. That is, if the assessment is five million and only three are paid, then the total assessment should be increased to cover the tax arrears. An equity from the ordinary assessment and another for a special surtax to cover tax arrears. To secure the power, the city should be authorized to levy a special tax on the amount of the surtax to be redeemed at the rate of one per cent, and which at a tax sale would be accepted at par by the city in payment for any property purchased at the sale. No tax arrears debentures had been issued at the rate of one per cent a day.

What the idea really amounted to, it was explained, was a compulsory loaning by the ratepayers of sufficient amount to cover the tax arrears, so that the city may be kept in operation with successful tax sale right along.

## POTASH IN ONTARIO TO KILL HUN MONOPOLY

From Common Feldspar Comes Ton a Day at Demonstration Plant—Inventor at Work

According to statements of the promoters to the Toronto Star, another important stage has been passed in the attempt to solve the problem of extracting potash from the common Ontario feldspar, which, though a demonstration plant only. The Star was told, is turning out this city of an average of one ton a day.

The proprietors and promoters are the National Potash Corporation, Ltd., the experimental plant is at 178 Spadina avenue, the commercial plant is under construction at Gravenhurst and will be forty times the size of the demonstration plant here.

The Star is informed that the United States government has placed orders with the company for two tons of potash a day for the next two years, the potash to be used for making permanganate of potash, a powerful disinfectant for the army, and that the British government has also made application for a supply.

Yesterday a reporter for The Star visited the Company's experimental plant on Spadina avenue. Alan Graus, the inventor of the process, was discovered in a large basement, not in the office, but in oil-saturated overalls, in the midst of tanks and towers and whirling machinery. You see the feldspar rock go into the machine—this is at the beginning—at the end you are presented with a handful of potash, slightly discolored owing to the iron in the tanks, and are bidden to taste it.

Long Process Between.

But there is a long process between this and it was explained to The Star as this. The raw material goes into the top of the black furnace. The heat there volatilizes the potash or drives it off as a fume. The potash fume is taken off from the top of the furnace in a large pipe and chases goes out at the bottom in molten liquid and is received into moulds that make paving bricks, a by-product. The potash fume or gas passes through the pipe into waste heat boilers, and the heat, as it is drawn off from the furnace gives enough power to run the plants. It is drawn from the waste heat boilers into air-compressors through which it is passed into tanks and thence into high pressure. After treatment in these tanks it is turned into a special gas condenser. Any remaining fume or gas is drawn away into chemical towers where it is further treated. The next process shows the potash leaving in a liquor which contains about 12 per cent potash, which sometimes runs to 28 per cent. Finally it is passed over into a vaporizer and thence into a crystal potash.

No Longer an Experiment.

"The process is no longer an experiment," a member of the company told The Star. "The results have been fifty per cent better than we ever claimed. Our experiments have shown that we can produce an average of 88 per cent of the potash content in the feldspar, and under the best conditions we can produce an average of 95 per cent. In a small furnace we did not look for more than 65 per cent, but now we can produce more than 95 per cent. We can produce a ton of potash for less than we claimed at the start. It was not cost more than 12½¢ a dollar a ton. Since the war potash prices have been reckoned in hundreds of dollars per ton."

## CANADIANS ARE PRAISED.

Splendid Corps Developed From the First Division.

London, Jan. 12.—General Sir John Dill, Minister of Militia, kept within the last few days has had an opportunity of discussing with General Sir Arthur Currie, the commander of the Canadian forces in France, questions concerning the corps, and has had daily consultations with General Turner.

Sir Edward says: "In the last year the Canadian division in the war has been the finest sort of discipline, and he added that the initiative characteristic of the Canadian soldier. Sir Arthur Currie has told me that the policy of keeping the Canadian corps always at full strength has greatly contributed to the efficiency of it."

Sir Edward Kenney has also been in consultation with the imperial authorities, including Lord Derry and General Robertson, and intends soon to inspect all important Canadian establishments in England and subsequently visit France.

## ALEXANDER AGAIN LEADS NATIONAL LEAGUE PITCHERS

New Cub Twirler Proved Most Effective in League Last Season

The work of Grover Cleveland Alexander stands out as the greatest pitching accomplishment of the last season, according to the official figures issued by Secretary John A. Heydler. Not only did Alexander win thirty games, but he pitched the best ball game of the season, a three New York Giants, who allowed 1.88 runs a game, while next comes Ferdie Schupp, with a 1.90 record. The leading pitchers of the league were left-handers. Ranking the pitchers according to the games won and lost, the three New York southpaws, Schupp, Salles and Benton, take the first rank. The earned-run records, however, show the effectiveness of other pitchers, regardless of where their clubs finished in the pennant race.

Schneider of Cincinnati, for example, barely won more games than he lost, yet he ranks fourth in the official standing with an earned-run average of 1.97. As far as the figures can tell, he suffered by reason of poor fielding support at critical stages of some of his games. In Schneider's case, fifty-three of the 128 runs scored off him were made after chances had been offered to retire the side.

Phil Douglas of the Cubs pitched in the greatest number of games—fifty-one—followed by Barnes of the Boston Braves, who was in fifty contests. Alexander led the right-handers in strike-outs, with 201 out of the 1,531 batsmen who faced him. Vaughn of the Cubs was the leading strike-out pitcher among the left-handers, with a total of 103.

Salles of the Giants and Schneider of the Cincinnati Reds were tied in consecutive victories, each with a run of nine. Two victories in one afternoon were pitched by Tony of the Reds against Pittsburgh by Alexander of the Phillies against Brooklyn, and by Doak of the Phillies against the Cubs.

One of the greatest pitching feats of the season happened in a game between Cincinnati and Chicago, when Tony and Vaughn went nine innings without allowing a base hit. In the tenth Vaughn pitched a perfect game, and scored the only no-hit game of the National League season.
