October Had Least Labor Trouble in Canada

ONLY EIGHT DISPUTES

30,000 Days Lost, But This is Smaller Number Than in Any Other Month—Chief Trouble That of Coal Miners in the West

(Canadian Press) Ottawa, Nov. 15.—The Department of labor reports that the industrial situation from the standpoint of the number of trade disputes in existence, was better in October than in any time during the year. The loss of time to employees through trade disputes actually during the month, was less than in any other month in the year. Only eight disputes were reported during the month, and in all of them only eight miles in existence. JUAREZ IN HANDS OF THE REBELS

Clever Ruse Places Town in Control of Constitutionalists—O'Shaughnessy May Be Recalled at Any Time

(Canadian Press) El Paso, Texas.—Juarez was captured by rebels this morning. Three Americans were killed in Juarez during the fighting. At 7 o'clock fighting was resumed. General Francisco Castro, commander of the Federal garrison, is missing, and it was believed he had escaped. Rebels fell thick in El Paso and all the residents were awakened by the sound of heavy artillery firing. The federal commander of the city, the constitutionalists, was at five o'clock, when the federal commander threw himself and his soldiers on the mercy of the victorious rebels. It was by one of the cleverest stratagems in the history of Mexico that Juarez was taken.

PAY MILLION DOLLARS TO SETTLE DEBTS OF PRINCESS
