World Notes

George Bernard Shaw declares that childbearing should be a paid profession. He says if he were a woman, his fee to become a mother would be \$10,000.

W. Wertheim and Co. of Berlin, who conduct a big department store, have failed. Liabilities were \$4,500,000. Assets \$125,000. This is an echo of the Princes Trust when the bloods of Germany thought they could skin the workers in trade as well as by owning land and running the government.

"White Wolf," a Chinese "brigand," is attacking and capturing Chinese cities. His success is endangering Yuan Shi Kai. If White Wolf will become an eminent statesman and can borrow millions from the Christian bankers of Europe, his brigands will become highly respected soldiers and when they kill, it will be under the guise of law and order.

The revolutionary movement is deeper and stronger in Russia to-day than when it attracted world-wide attention in 1905. To-day there are two Socialist dailies in the Russian language and the weekly with which I am connected, printed in the Russian capital. Fourteen Socialists sit in the Russian Duma. This is the way in which Marx Gollfarb summarized the situation in Russia during a speech in St. Louis.

With the intention of busting the Housing Trust, syndicates of middle class and working class flat dwellers have been formed all over Switzerland, and are making a bitter fight. The Housing Trust have boosted rents thirty per cent in the past few years.

The Chinese government have issued new press laws. Publishers, editors and printers must be over thirty years of age and must not be officials or students. All publications must be licensed by the local police officer and security must be given. They must not "misrepresent" the system of government under penalty of confiscation and imprisonment of publisher, editor and printer. Articles "disturbing the peace" or revealing diplomatic, political or military secrets are punishable by death.

Har Dyal, Hindoo philosopher, arrested in the U. S. and held for deportation for advocating armed revolt in India, quotes Bryan in his defense. William Jennings Bryan, writing in 1908 on British rule in India, declared, "British rule in India is legalized pillage. This is a strong word, but no refinement of language can purge the present system of its iniquity. The government of India is as arbitrary and despotic as the government of Russia ever was."

The March number of "Nineteenth Century and After" publishes an article advocating a Cabinet Minister for Britain to represent women. Arrangements are being made for 1,100 British co-operators to visit Paris for a week, while French parties are being arranged to visit Belgium.

German Socialists recently instituted a "Red Week" to boost Socialism. As a result, the party has 120,000 new members and the national Socialist journal has 53,100 readers. The party membership is now 1,100,000.

M. Tutrovitch, editor of the fortnightly publication of the Serbian Socialist party has been sentenced to jail for writing a book criticizing the late war.

122,000 youths are under forced military training in Australia. Prosecution for refusing to train number 21,300 and 3,400 boys have been imprisoned.

K. Mikhail, a well known Egyptian journalist, has written a pamphlet exposing the suppression of a free press in Egypt by the British. Criticism of the English rule is not allowed.

S. P. of C. Local Suggests a Referendum

We, the Socialists of Ekville, Alberta, Local No. 58, S. P. of C., are pleased to note the position taken by the official organ, Cotton's Weekly, and the Western Clarion, regarding the probability of the unity of the two Socialist parties of Canada.

We, however, respectfully call the attention of the members to a few existing conditions which are a hindrance because of the disorder of the parties.

1st. That of our provincial secretaries through lack of sufficient remuneration, are unable to devote their entire time and attention to the parties' interests, regarding organizers, correspondence with locals, distribution of literature, etc.

2nd. We are reproached with the condition of being divided among ourselves, because of the two parties.

Furthermore, it is not a fact that the tactics adopted by all ruling powers are: Divide and rule, meaning, to keep the voters divided by continually placing new issues before the public, while they, being the interpreters, become elected and rule to their interest?

Therefore, we think that we are justified in saying: United we win; divided we fail!

In view of the foregoing statements would it not be advisable to submit to a referendum vote the joining of the two parties under some one name? We shall be pleased to hear the expressions of other locals of the two parties.

American Notes

John D. Rockefeller, Jr., declares that the mineowners of Colorado are prepared to lose every cent invested rather than yield to the miners union. John D. is some bluffer.

Secretary of the Navy Daniels has signed an order which absolutely prohibits the use or introduction of alcoholic liquor upon any vessel of the navy or within the confines of any navy yard or short station. This rule is to go into effect July 1, 1914.

By the unanimous vote of three employers, three employees and three representatives of the public, \$10 per week is recommended as this minimum wage for women employees of mercantile establishments at Washington's first minimum wage conference which met recently at Olympia, Wash. In the state of Oregon the minimum wage has been fixed at \$9.25 for Portland and \$8.25 for the rest of the state.

Two unemployed agitators of New York City who at a demonstration in Rutgers Square called the police hoodlums have been jailed for two months.

Illinois miners have voted \$150,000 to aid the striking coal miners of Colorado.

New York Central railway has discharged 27,600 men in six months. The Pennsylvania has let out 15,000. Other railways have discharged thousands of employees. The railways are going to teach Wilson who rules, the railways or the government.

Regulating the hours and working conditions of nurses, housemaids and cooks and other domestic servants is urged by the Pennsylvania State Commission of Labor Relations.

The Socialists of the Seventh Congressional District of Oklahoma are working hard to return a Congressman to Washington this fall.

The Socialists of St. Louis have won three shipments of clothing and shoes to the striking miners of Colorado.

The Executive of the Socialist Party employ 32 persons. Headquarters are in Chicago, and the rent for cramped quarters is \$2,500 per year. The Executive is urging the Party to buy a plot in the suburbs and build.

The Socialists in the recent election held Butte, Montana, and gained control of Missoula. Butte has a population of 39,165 and Missoula has a population of 12,869.

The old party fusion in Girard, Kansas, has lost that town to the Socialists. Houghton, Socialist, was elected mayor three years ago. Although the Socialist vote increased 44 per cent, the fusion won out.

In the election for Congressman in the 7th Congressional district of New Jersey, Demarest, the Socialist candidate received 5,053 votes, which tripled the vote of 1912. The republican candidate received 10,620 votes and the Democratic candidate received 5,240 votes.
