At a meeting of the water and sewerage board next Friday F. E. Barber will be called before the committee of the board.

The recent spell of fine weather has enabled the contractors to get along well with the work.

The dam at Robertson's Lake has now reached a stage when there is no fear of any damage being done in the event of work having to be discontinued through a severe frost.

On section three the conduit is completed as far as the tunnel of which, out of a total length of more than 700 feet, only 150 feet remain to be bored.

PRESIDENT McCALL WILL REFUND MONEY \$225,000 of Misdirected Funds Will Be Returned.

Andrew Hamilton, the Lawyer Who Looks After the Company's Lobbying Must Return From Europe

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—John A. McCall, president of the New York Insurance Company, was called before the Armstrong committee of insurance investigation today and peremptorily ordered by the committee to demand the return from Europe to this country of Andrew Hamilton, the lawyer who has had charge of the legislative matters for the New York Life. Mr. McCall was further ordered to demand an accounting from Hamilton of the moneys expended by him and of the balance which he owes the New York Life.

Mr. McCall said that it was the policy of his company to have Mr. Hamilton remain abroad until after the investigation into the case of the New York Life, the sum of \$225,000 by Dec. 1st, he would himself pay it to the company.

Mr. McCall said Mr. Hamilton was either Ernest M. Nields, the president of the Metropolitan Life, or an employee of the Equitable Life, was called. He produced letter books and memoranda which Mr. Hughes read, and was in the midst of reading when adjournment was taken.



MORE TROUBLE FOR OWNERS OF BAVARIAN

Diver Reports That Big Ship Struck on Reef Amidships.

QUEBEC, Nov. 13.—The efforts of wreckers to float the Allan steamer Bavarian have been unfortunately set back by the loss of Davies' wrecking schooner, which was destroyed by fire near Wie Rock Saturday morning.

The fire is said to have originated among a quantity of naphtha and oil in the hold of the schooner, and George Davies and the men on board had a narrow escape. The destruction of the schooner is a serious loss to its owners and Diver Beggs who lost the entire diver diving apparatus, besides four pumps and wrecking material.

The Allan steamer to the wreck yesterday morning and returned last night. He reports no change in the position of the steamer. Yesterday a number of air pumps from Halifax, New York and Montreal were taken down to the wreck, to be used in an attempt to raise and float the vessel. Diver Beggs, who is in charge of the operation of the ship, reports that he had examined all that portion of the ship to the northward and found that she had struck on a reef amidships. Wreckers are endeavoring to platform the engine room and also make it watertight to prevent the leakage of water when the vessel is being raised by compressed air. In the meantime the engines and boilers are being made fast to the deck of the ship.

SEASON LAST YEAR WAS MUCH COLDER

FREDERICTON, N. B., Nov. 13.—One year ago today the river at this point was frozen over. The Fredericton Boom Co. are not going to be caught napping and for that reason they started today to take up the booms and have them placed in winter quarters.

Saturday night lumbering operations at Springhill were concluded for the season. A lot of lumber for the season had been going on for about three weeks and during that time about 1,500,000 feet of lumber, or between 300 and 400 jobs was handled. This lumber had been rafted by jobbers down the river at the regular Boom company's rates and was freighted at Springhill under the supervision of Harry Macquarrie of D. D. Glazier & Sons' estate.

The lumber was brought down river after being hung up, by means of a channel which had been dug at Burpee Bar under the direction of Robert Atkinson, who represented the owners of the lumber.

The lumber was all towed to St. John by the tugs of the Sewell and Glazier estates.

Including bank lumber there was about 10,000,000 feet of lumber floated this season. This amount is below the average.

There were seven estimated feet of logs hung up between here and Grand Falls. This does not include about three millions of bank lumber which could not be rafted this year owing to the low water.

SENSATION IN ST. ANNE'S ELECTION TRIAL

MONTREAL, Nov. 13.—A decided sensation was provided in the court room this morning in the St. Anne's election trial when a witness for the prisoners, named Dennis Maher, under cross-examination by Ferron, stated that he had been approached by one George Gaynor, who secured his address and told him there was \$50 in it if he would come to court and give evidence against the witness. The witness said he replied that he would do anything to hang Gaynor, and shortly afterwards he received an invitation from Hamilton & Allison to call at their office and tell them what he knew. No amount of cross-examination could shake his story, and Justice Davidson, while expressly exonerating Hamilton from any possible knowledge of such a thing, said it was a serious matter and that other witnesses should be called on the point to which Allison agreed.

FORMER EDITOR DEAD.

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 13.—Frederick Mosley, stipendiary magistrate of Sydney, died tonight after a few days' illness of pneumonia. He was a brother of the late Hon. E. T. Mosley and for many years was editor of the Cape Breton Advocate. He married a daughter of the late Senator Bourton.
