ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 25—State Comptroller Glynn announced today that he has called upon the Attorney General to begin proceedings against the Mercantile Safe Deposit Company of New York City, for permitting the safe deposit box of the late Russell Sage, containing a large amount of Sage securities, to be opened by one of the executors of the Sage estate without the consent or knowledge of the State Comptroller Department. Comptroller Glynn says he has rethe State Comptroller Department. Comptroller Glynn says he has requested the Attorney General to enforce the collection of the legal penalty for the violation of the law.

The comptroller in his letter to the Attorney General says: "Shortly after the death of Russell Sage, the Mercantile Safe Deposit Co., of New York, delivered to Charles W. Osborne, one of the executors of his last will and testament, certain securities and other assets belonging to the above decedent which were contained in a safe deposit box in their vaults, without having given the comptroller notice of such intended delivery or having secured his consent thereto. Such action on the part of said company was in direct violation of the provisions of section 277 of the transfer tax law and subjected it to a penalty of one thousand dollars."
